MR. HARRY KEE LIKELY TO HAVE DOME SHAFT CONTRACT

In commenting on the annual meeting of the Dome Mines at Toronto on Tuesday, the following despatch came over the Homer L. Gibson & Co. private wire yesterday:—

Toronto, April 6.—The Dome meeting yesterday was quite peaceful in character, shareholders present apparently being fully in accord with the directorate in their plan to conserve the assets of the company by the reduction of the dividend from \$2 per share annually to \$1. A gesture of friendliness towards the Canadian shareholders was made by the selection of Robert Segsworth as a new director.

Probably the feature of the meeting was the announcement made by DePencier of the decision to sink the No. 4 shaft on Dome Extension to 3,000 feet and to thoroughly explore from that depth. He stated that the formation in this section was favourable and seemed hopeful of results.

At the same time he made the statement that if this work proved unsuccessful it would be the last effort to re-establish Dome so far as the Porcupine property is concerned. Since the issuance of the annual statement no developments of importance have taken place. Considerable diamond drilling had been undertaken from different levels but results had not been encouraging.

While no mention was made at the meeting in connection with Harry Kee as having the contract for the sinking of the shaft, it was intimated by an official before the meeting that he would likely do the work.

RED LAKE RAILWAY BILL KILLED IN THE COMMONS.

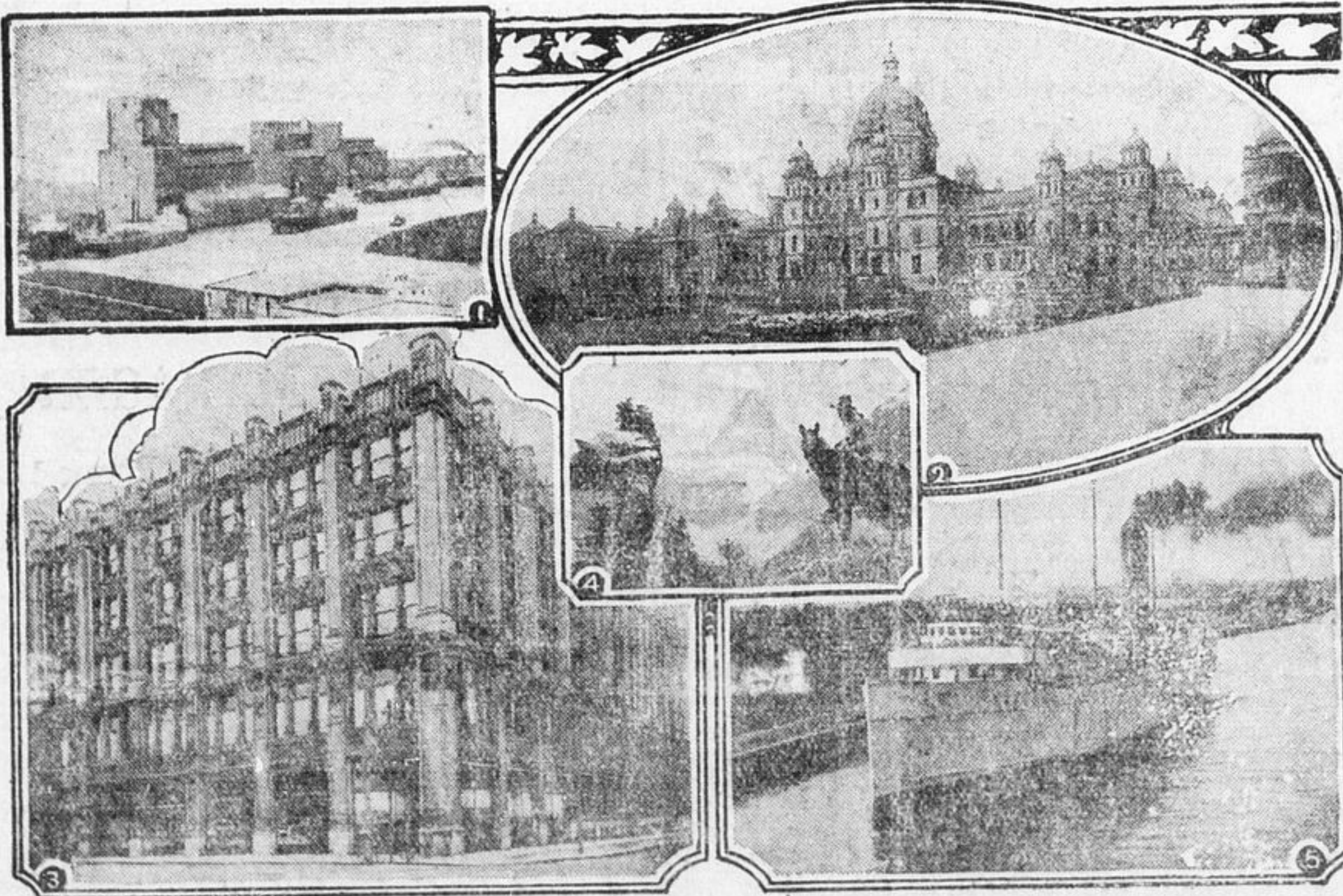
The bill to incorporate the Red Lake and Northwestern Railway was rejected on Tuesday by the Railway Committee of the House of Commons. It was supported by A. E. Lapierre, Liberal Nipissing; J. A. Bradette, Timiskaming North, and Hon. Peter Heenan, Minister of Labour. Opposition developed to the bill from the members who argued that the National Railway should have the rights in the district.

Canada's Diamond Jubilee

The Dominion-wide celebration of Canada's sixtieth year of Confederation which is being planned for July of this year, will be the most remarkable and extensive ever held. The last links of a united Canada were placed in position forty years ago with the completion of the Canadian Pacific Railway. It is in furthering the bond between the peoples of the east and the west that this country will be engaged to a large extent during the celebration. One of the most spectacular of plans for bringing the people of all parts of Canada together under

pleasant auspices and at the same time affording them an opportunity of gaining greater first hand knowledge of their country through personal contact has been arranged by the New Outlook, official organ of the United Church of Canada. On June 25th, a "million dollar" special train will leave Toronto with a limited number of passengers from the eastern provinces aboard, and follow the confederation route. The "Confederation Special," as it will be called, will be operated on the all-expense plan which will enable practically all who have the time to

travel to do so. It will touch all the principal cities and resorts in the west and operate for twenty-one days. The hospitality of the westerners is well known, so it is not surprising to learn that when the first announcement of the train was made, organizations and individuals in every city included in the itinerary offered to entertain the party and see that it was given every facility for sight seeing and enjoyment. The latest invitation is from the Prince of Wales's Ranch at High River to which the members of the special train party will motor from Calgary on July 1st.

INTERESTED IN COPPER FIELDS IN MANITOBA

The Pas Herald, of The Pas, Manitoba, last week says:—"R. Graham has optioned his property at Aimee Lake to N. A. Timmins, Inc., and Hollinger Consolidated, and drilling on the property will be commenced immediately. This is a copper proposition located in the Athapascow district, about five miles north of the Baker-Paton property. There is a group of five claims and considerable development work has been done by Mr. Graham. W. Greenland, a well-known mining engineer recently visited and reported on the property. Following this, a deal was made with N. A. Timmins, Inc., and Hollinger Consolidated, and diamond drilling will be commenced immediately. H. M. Whimster, M.E., arrived on Tuesday to take charge of the work. The property has never before been under option and the work already done consists of stripping and trenching. Enough of this has been done to expose some very rich ore, similar to that of the Mandy mine in the same district, from which 2,500 tons of ore was taken and shipped to the smelter at Trail, B.C., during the years 1918-19."
