Monday evening, April 11th, in the United church, Timmins; Rev. R. S. Cushing to speak on "Reverence."

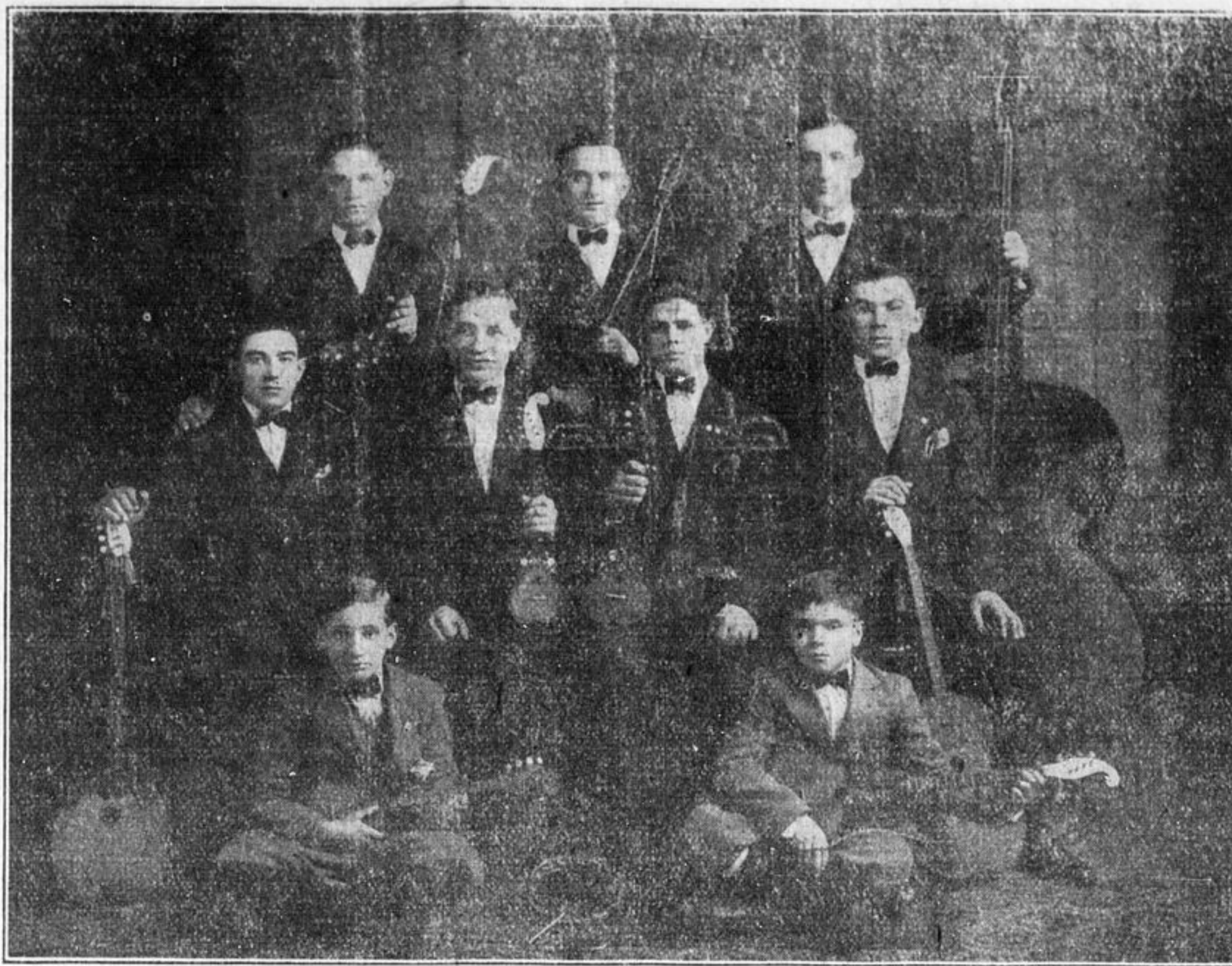
Tuesday evening, in the St. Matthew's Anglican church; Rev. J. D. Parks to be the preacher, and his subject to be "Sincerity."

## To Start English Pheasants In This Part of the North

Porcupine Rod & Gun Club Has Plans Under Way to This Good End. Also to Stock Certain Rivers and Creeks with Speckled Trout Fry. Letters Received Complimenting Club on Its Efforts.

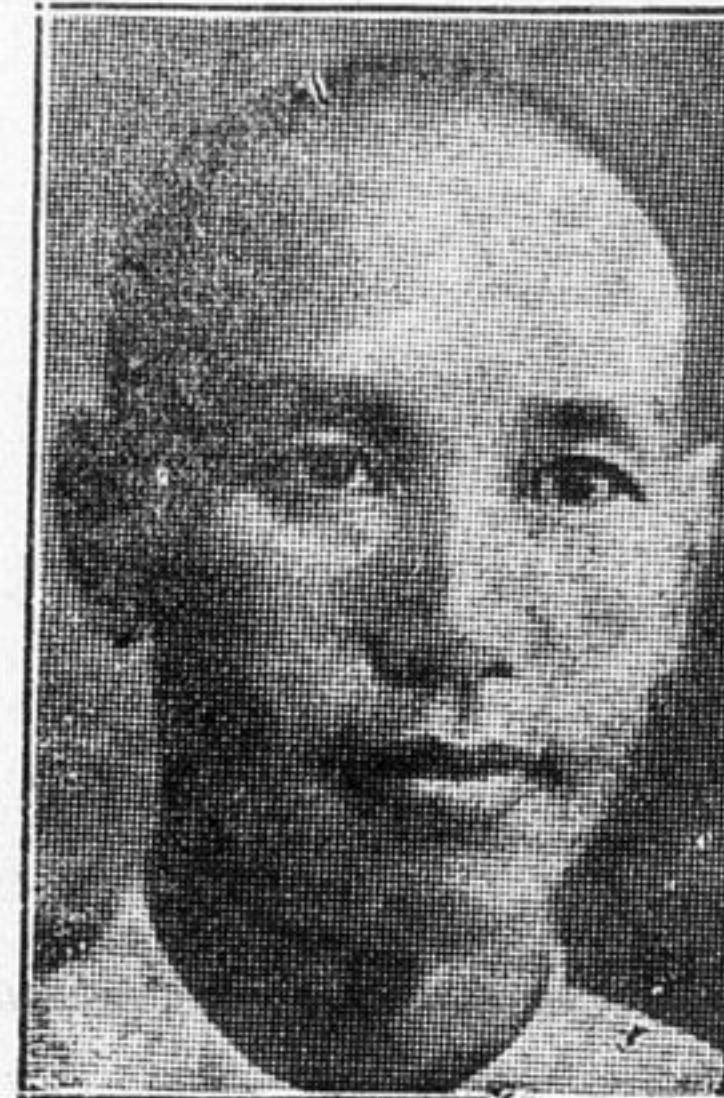
The Porcupine Rod and Gun Club has made application for a number of settings of English Pheasant eggs, to be hatched, and the birds released in the district when old enough to take care of themselves. It is hoped that in a few years' time, with proper protection, this district will be able to enjoy a few days' pheasant shooting, the same as in some other parts of Ontario. As noted some time ago in The Advance, English pheasants have been brought to Temiskaming district and have thrived well in the district around New Liskeard.

Another thing the Porcupine Rod and Gun Club has looked after is the matter of stocking certain waters in the district with speckled trout fry. It is intended to stock the following waters:—Mattagami river, Redstone river, Bristol creek, Craft's creek, Shaw's creek, Grassy river, Redsnaker river, and Kamiskotia river. The requisitions for the fry have been placed with the Fish and Game Department, Toronto, and duly endorsed by the local member, Mr. A. F. Ken-

ning. This week the secretary of the Rod and Gun Club, Mr. J. D. Brady, received the acknowledgement of the requisitions and was advised by the department that all requisitions had been placed on file for consideration when shipments were being made by the Provincial Hatcheries.

Among the recent communications received by Secretary Brady was one from Mr. F. Canover, of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa, and one from the president of Jack Miner's Club, congratulating the Porcupine Rod and Gun Club on the splendid efforts they are making in the interests of wild life in the North Land and assuring them of co-operation in everything possible.

## ALL RADIO LICENSES ARE NOW DUE AND PAYABLE

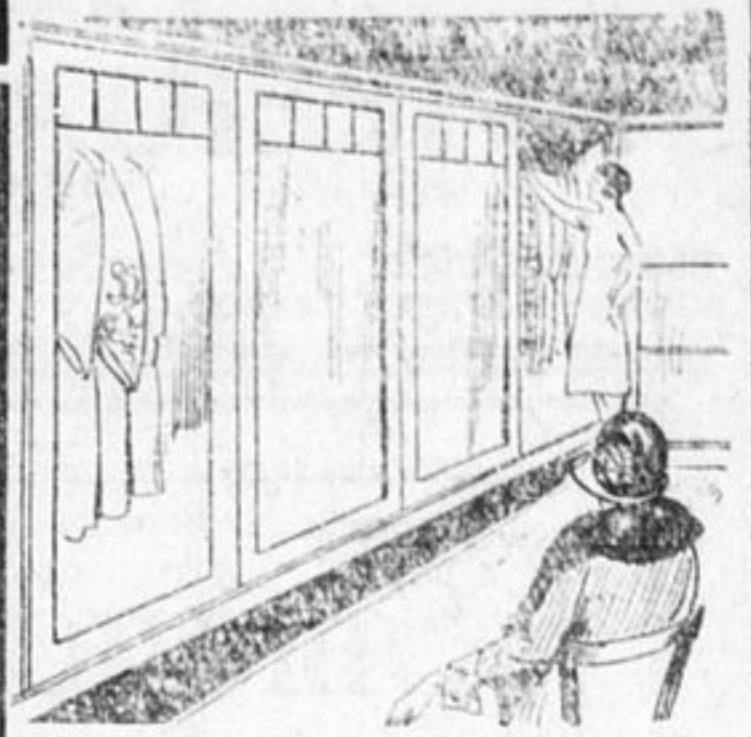

The latter was in the employ of the Northern Canada Power Co. at Timmins for about two years. A year having passed without the young man being heard from at home, the father wrote to the Power Co. He received a reply to the effect that Harold H. Edwards had left the employ of that company, and while they thought he had gone to Toronto, they had no knowledge of his present address. Later, Mr. O. J. Edwards wrote the Provincial Secretary at Toronto, and made other efforts to locate his son, but all without result. The father now has written asking the assistance of The Advance, and The Advance is very anxious to assist. It will be readily understood that the matter is causing the deepest anxiety in the family circle. If this paragraph should meet the eye of the young man in question, or of anyone who can give any information in the matter, The Advance will be very glad to relieve the anxiety of the relatives by forwarding on any particulars.
