Tournament to Decide the Titles of the North Country in this Popular Sport.

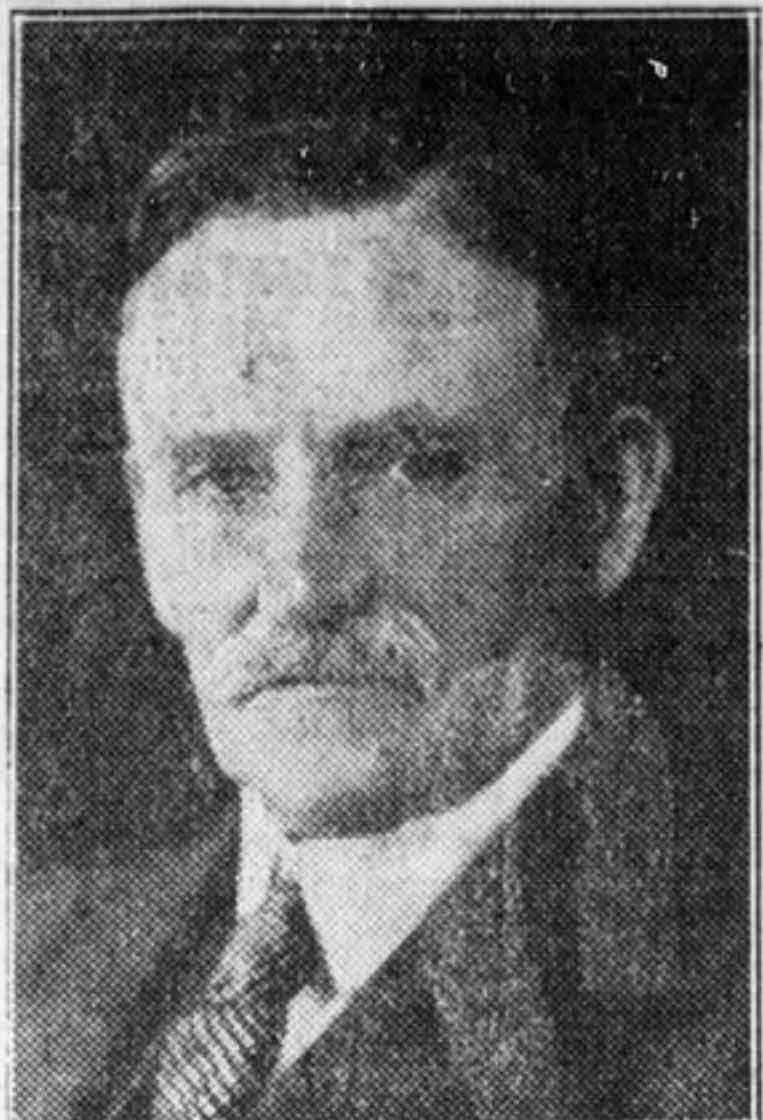

## INJURED BOY TAKEN TO TORONTO FOR TREATMENT.

Last week Roger Emden, the eight-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Emden, of "104," near Cobalt, was taken to Toronto last week for special treatment at the hospital there. In the early part of March, the lad was injured in the arms by a pair of scissors in the hands of Mike Gleason. The doctors some days ago decided that he should be taken to Toronto, as the lad's arm was not improving as it should. The boy for the time had practically lost the use of the arm. It is hoped that in Toronto the hospital treatment will assure a complete and speedy recovery.
