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**THOUGHT TO HAVE DIED  
AFTER DRINKING ALCOHOL**

Trapper of Jacksonboro District Found Dead Upon Trail. Man Arrested on Charge of Selling Liquor.

According to word coming from the North last week, Sandy Martin, a well-known trapper of the Jacksonboro district, was found dead on the trail between his home on the Mattagami River and the Jacksonboro settlement. An inquest was held by Coroner E. R. Tucker. The verdict of the jury was to the effect that death was due to exposure while in an intoxicated condition. The evidence suggested that the deceased had traded some skins said to be valued at \$25.00 for a gallon of alcohol. Apparently Martin had partaken of his purchase, and the final outcome was his death on the trail. Martin was about 45 years of age. At the inquest Mrs. Martin said that her husband bought the liquor from "Big Mike," a fur buyer when the latter visited their place to buy furs. Apparently Martin agreed to take payment for the furs in alcohol. Then Martin hitched up his team of five dogs and started down the trail. He was not again seen alive. The body was discovered some little distance off the trail and away from the sleigh. The dogs had fought among themselves and the biggest animal had been killed and partly eaten by his canine companions, while part of the dead man's hand had been chewed away by the beasts. A post mortem examination of Martin's body revealed no signs of foul play, while an analysis of his internal organs showed the bladder to contain a high percentage of alcohol.

Following the evidence at the inquest Mike Yeromeuk was arrested on a charge of selling liquor to an Indian. Yeromeuk is out on heavy bail, and will likely appear before the magistrate at Cochrane on Monday next week.

**Short Circuit Causes Fire  
at Dome Pump House Tuesday**

Leak in One of the Pumps Allows Stream to Make Circuit. Fire Does Some Damage to Upper Storey. Cement Floor Saves Most of Machinery from Injury.

South Porcupine, April 20th. Special to The Advance.

On Tuesday afternoon a fire alarm was rung in from the Dome pump house about three o'clock. Hilton Miller was the first car there to take over some hose. When it was found that the fire was in Whitney consent had to be obtained from the municipality of Tisdale before apparatus could be taken over. The large fire truck could not get over owing to the poor roads but most of the firemen got there anyway. Owing to the presence of live wires, etc., one of the bosses from the Dome would not let them enter the building when they got there until it was certain the power was all shut off. By that time a number of boys from the Dome had reached the place and a bucket brigade was formed, there being no place for attaching the large fire hose. Fortunately the emergency pump at Simpson Lake had been put in readiness that very day for use as repairs on the main pumps and line had been contemplated by the Dome. With the aid of the bucket brigade and such help as was got from the emergency line, there is no very serious damage done to the machinery, and all the furniture which belonged to Vernon Andrews in the living apartments was got out safely. The switches and transformers are burnt out, the fire having originated from water from one of the pumps striking the switch. The electricians were working on the packing of one of the pumps in which the water was much higher than had been contemplated and a leak occurred. A sudden spurt of water striking the switches was the

cause we heard given for the fire. The stream which reached the switch passed within a very few inches above the body of one of the men who was leaning over a part of the machinery while at his work, and it is most fortunate that he was out of the line of the water or he would surely have been electrocuted. In fact there were several of the workers who narrowly missed electrocution as electricity was shorting everywhere, but luckily no one was injured and the emergency pump being in readiness the work at the Dome is progressing as usual. The roof of the building collapsed, but there being a cement floor over the machinery none of it was damaged. Mr. Andrews had just gone back to the draughting department at the Dome, and Mr. S. Lloyd had taken over the pump house work, but fortunately had not yet moved his family there. Owing to the state of the roads Mr. Andrews had not moved out his furniture but roads or no roads it was moved on Tuesday.

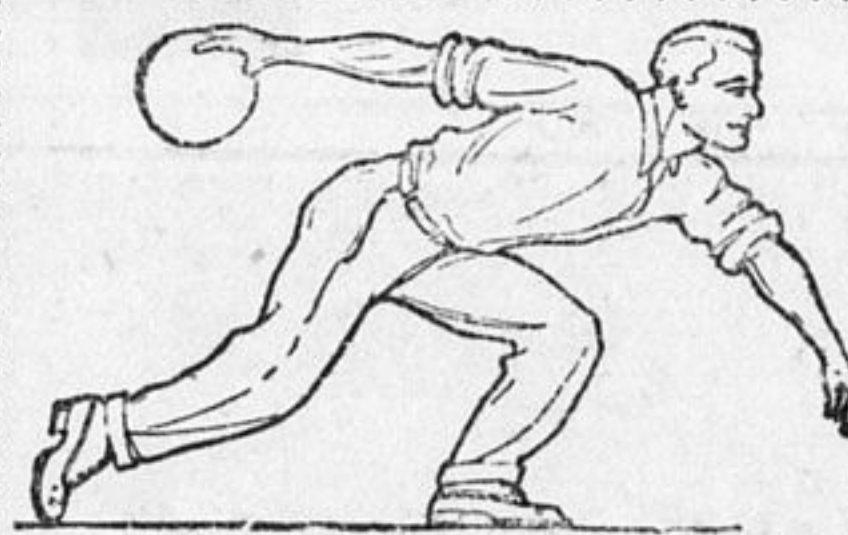

**HARDWOOD INDUSTRY FOR BRUCE MINES DISTRICT**

Hon. William Finlayson, Provincial Minister of Lands and Forests, announces that the Government has reached an agreement with the Caledonian Hardwoods Production Company, Limited, whereby British capital to the extent of \$1,167,000 will be invested in the development of the hardwood industry along the north shore of Georgian Bay and Lake Huron. Under the terms of the agreement the company is buying from the province a concession of 25 townships; and it is believed that the same interests have acquired about ten other townships by private purchase. All these properties extend along the north shore from Blind River westward beyond Bruce Mines, and are said to possess extensive stands of birch and maple.
