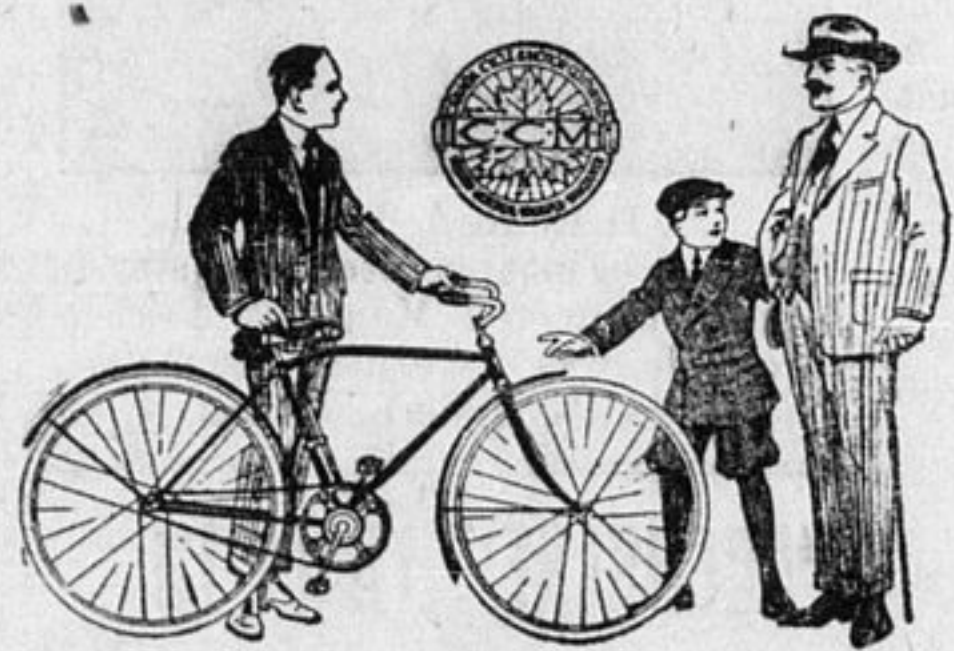

PLAN NEW COMPANY TO BUY CONSOLIDATED WEST DOME

Matter to be Submitted to Special General Meeting Called for May 10th.

A special general meeting of the shareholders of the Consolidated West Dome Lake Mines, Limited, has been called for May 10th, to consider the sale of the assets of the company to a new company to be incorporated, having an authorized capitalization of 7,000,000 shares of no par value. The new company would assume the debts and liabilities of the old company outstanding on the date of the closing of the sale, and would pay the costs incidental to the distribution of the assets and the surrender of the charter. This is according to word from Toronto last week. It is understood that the directors have considered the by-law to give effect to the above plan, and are agreed on its desirability.

Further it is understood that the adjourned annual meeting will be completed on the same day as the special general meeting.

The by-law regarding the proposed new company provides that the new company would "have, as unissued shares in its treasury, all its authorized capital stock except the shares to be issued to this company or its nominees, and except not more than ten shares to be subscribed and allotted in connection with the incorporation and organization of such new company, the consideration for the sale to be the issue and allotment to this company or its nominees of 3,500,000 shares of no par value of the capital stock of such new company to be issues as fully paid shares to this company or its nominees, and the assumption, as aforesaid, of the debts and liabilities of this company as they shall exist on the date of closing the sale, and the assumption and payment by the new company of the costs of and incidental to the distribution of the assets of this company and the surrender of its charter, but as a condition precedent to any obligation on the part of this company to carry out the sale such new company shall satisfy the secretary of this company that it has at least 667,000 shares of its capital stock subscribed for and underwritten at the price of 15 cents per share, payable on demand, by persons of financial standing satisfactory to the secretary of this company. The sale to be closed as soon as the same has been authorized and the by-law ratified, approved and sanctioned by the shareholders of this company at a special general meeting to be called for that purpose, all as required by the Ontario Companies Act."

Each shareholder of record on a date to be named by the secretary, would receive one share of the new company for each two he now holds, and the balance, if any, of the said shares not required for such distribution be, without consideration, returned to the new company, to be by it sold for the benefit of its treasury.

The notice calling the meeting states that the directors have already arranged that upon the new company being incorporated and acquiring the assets of this company the directors among themselves will subscribe and pay for 667,000 shares of the capital stock of the new company at 15 cents per share, and 1,500,000 shares of the new company's capital stock will be offered to the shareholders for subscription at 10 cents per share. They recommend the proposed sale of the assets of the company and of treasury shares of the new company as being the most feasible method of raising the necessary funds to develop the mine.
