PLANE GOES THROUGH ICE NEAR HAILEYBURY DOCK

A rather unusual accident is recorded in The New Liskeard Speaker last week. It was what The Speaker terms " a fortunate misfortune." The

Speaker says:— "A fortunate misfortune happened to the Patricia Airways plane on Saturday last out in Lake Temiskaming close to the Haileybury dock. We say fortunate because, had the accident happened at many other places four live might have been lost, while the event certainly is a misfortune to the Company. The plane was making what is said to have been the last trip until the ice had disappeared and had two passengers and a small dog on board, in addition to the pilot and mechanic and some luggage. A splendid landing had been made on the ice and while the plane was cruising over the ice to land it struck a weak stretch in the ice and crushed through. The nose of the plane dipped allowing the propeller to hit the ice, smashing it. At the same time the pilot, who was strapped in his seat was given a cold bath before he was able to extricate himself. The other members of the party managed to get to solid ice but little the worse of the mishap. The plane was raised as high as ice conditions would allow, and has had one wing damaged in addition to the propeller. At time of writing the plane still sits out on the ice some distance from land. However, the machine will soon be in running condition again to earry on the work for which it has been brought to the north."
