## GUARD AGAINST THE WILY HIGH-PRESSURE SALESMAN

"Examine Every Proposition Offered You" is Good Advice to the Investor.

At the present time there is a regular epidemic of high-pressure salesmanship of stocks and bonds and realty ventures all over the country. "It's a sign of prosperity," as one paper points out, but it is also an omen that a lot of people are going to lose some money. Some of the commercial and industrial propositions make the wildest mining wild cat look like a playful and harmless kitten. The Northern Miner last week dealt with the matter in very effective way in the following editorial:

"Hard on the heels of the wave of prosperity throughout Canada there has come a Mississippi flood of salesmen offering securities of very questionable character. The promotion of legitimate mining enterprises is not the only sufferer from the horde of high pressure artists. Those who are conducting honest and decent efforts to finance proper industrial and real estate ventures find their work hampered by the activities of men and women pushing stuff that comes close to, if it does not cross, the border mark of swindles.

"And many hundreds of thousands of dollars that should find its way into the work of building up the country is being taken away, a lot if it across the border. People who can ill-afford any losses are being actually robbed of their money in many cases, or are being persuaded to put it into ventures that haven't a ghostly chance

of making good. Young men and women schooled in classrooms, fired with the "inspiration" of slick-talking spellbinders, are going around getting their friends and relations to put their savings into propositions which divert the major part of those savings into promoters' pockets.

"From all across Canada comes word of stock and realty frauds. It is a sign of prosperity, but it is also a sign that Government officials, responsible men, such as bankers and established brokers and of financial and mining papers, should be more keen than ever to instruct the public as to the difference between good offerings and bad. And we think that for one thing, the authorities should move at once to stop the deluge of pseudo-financial sheets coming from across the line, wildcat rags that masquerade as public papers but which are nothing but the organs of promoters pushing stocks of most doubtful character. The "censor" forbids the mails to pornographic sheets which corrupt the young. Surely it is also important to stop the robbing of uninformed men and women, often of their total savings.

"It is time to be on one's guard. Let the buyer beware—an old, old rule but good to-day.

"Men who will wonder and ponder weeks over the purchase of a \$2,000 car will throw the same money without a moment's hesitation into the hands of some stranger whom they know nothing about. Take your time, examine carefully any proposition offered you. If it's really good, it will keep while you think it over and investigate all angles.

"Really sound propositions don't have to be urged and high-pressured on to people. They sell themselves. The more the salesman insists and pushes you, the more determined you should be not to buy."
