DROWNED FROM BOOM IN MATTAGAMI RIVER

Thomas Sloan Meets Accidental Death While at Work on the River on Wednesday

Wednesday morning of this week about 8.30 while at work in charge of a boom for S. McChesney & Sons, Thomas Sloan, a young man of 27, fell into the river and was drowned. He had just opened the boom to allow a launch to pass, and the boatman hearing a splash put on speed but arrived too late to save him. His hat was noticed on the water and no trace of him. Help was hurriedly secured, the Fire Rangers taking charge and doing excellent work. At 11.30, by the use of the town's grappling irons, they had recovered the body from the river. Coroner H. E. Montgomery was notified and after enquiry saw that an inquest was unnecessary. The accident took place up the river at Heawyer Farm.

The late Thomas Sloan came here in April of this year. He was a single man, and his home is in Calumet, Que., where the remains will be taken tomorrow. The young man had made many friends here and there is sincere sorrow in his untimely death. He was a companionable young man of fine character and much respected by all who knew him.

PEMBROKE VISITORS WERE HELD UP BY TOUGH GANG.

When the train bearing the visiting Pembroke Kivansians stopped at South Porcupine Wednesday, for a little time the visitors were tempted to believe that some of the stories of this wild North were true. At South End, about a dozen tough-looking customers, in rough miners' clothes, and some with struggling beards and dirty faces, boarded the car and ordered all to put up their hands. There were shots fired, and the visitors had no way of knowing that they were blanks. BIG INCREASE IN SAVINGS

Ottawa, Canada.—Another new high mark for savings deposits in Canada feature the February statement of the chartered banks.

Since about the middle of last year, the savings deposits in Canada have been steadily rising, and at the end of February they touched a new peak of \$1,389,609,017, an increase of eight million over the previous month, and an advance of fifty-seven million over February of last year.

"The only way to censor a movie or play is to get up and leave," declared Dr. Stephen Leacock in an address at Montreal.

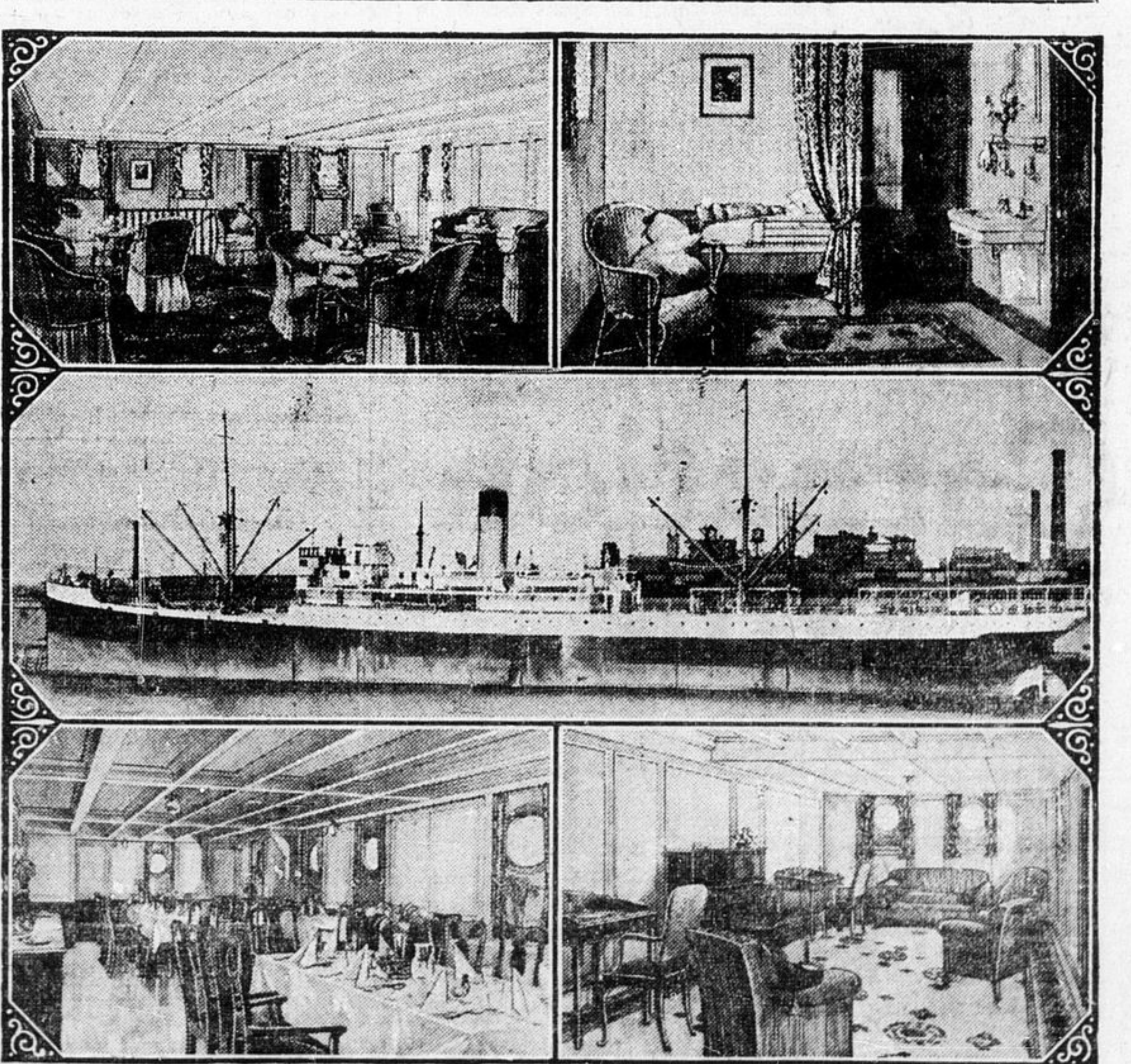
Linen, from the finest handkerchief fabric to the heavier variety, is playing an important part in Summer wardrobes.

RE-FITTED FOR WEST INDIES SERVICE



Re-fitted for service on the S.S. Canada-West Indies service, the S.S. Canadian Skirmisher of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine fleet, made her first sailing under the new schedule from Halifax on May 20. She is being followed by the S.S. Canadian Pathfinder, which like the Skirmisher has undergone extensive improvements, converting her from a cargo steamer to a three-class passenger steamship for the West Indies service.

These vessels now have accommodation for 50 first-class passengers. First-class accommodation is tastefully fitted up, the public rooms being luxuriously arranged. The vessels have 15 two-berth and 6 three-berth cabins in this section. Accommodation is provided for 32 second-class passengers, whose quarters are tastefully laid out.

The Canadian Skirmisher, with her sister ships will provide a monthly service between Canadian and West Indies ports under the new trade agreement. She is an oil-burning steel screw steamer, with a speed of 12 knots and was built in 1921 at Vancouver by the Wallace Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Co.
