LITTLE BOY DIES ON FIRST ANNIVERSARY OF BIRTH

Hubert, the little son of Mr. and Mrs. Mansen Smith, 261 Pine street south, who was born on May 19th, 1926, died on May 19th, 1927, just exactly one year from the time of his birth. The little lad had fallen on the floor, slightly bruising his knee. Although prompt attention was given the injury, it did not appear to be serious, and it was some days before it became apparent that the knee was in bad condition. Another doctor was called in consultation, and the decision arrived at to operate on the knee. The operation was successfully carried out, considerable pus being removed from the child's knee. Later, the youngster suffered convulsions, and despite all medical skill and attention passed away on May 19th. The funeral took place on Saturday, May 21st, service being held at the residence of the parents and at the Timmins cemetery by Rev. R. Hall. Work Commenced This Week on New Technical High School

Contract for Work Awarded to Hill-Clark-Francis. Contract Price Practically the Same as Estimate Submitted to Council. Government to Pay 75 per cent. of Cost. Addition to be Completed by November 15th.

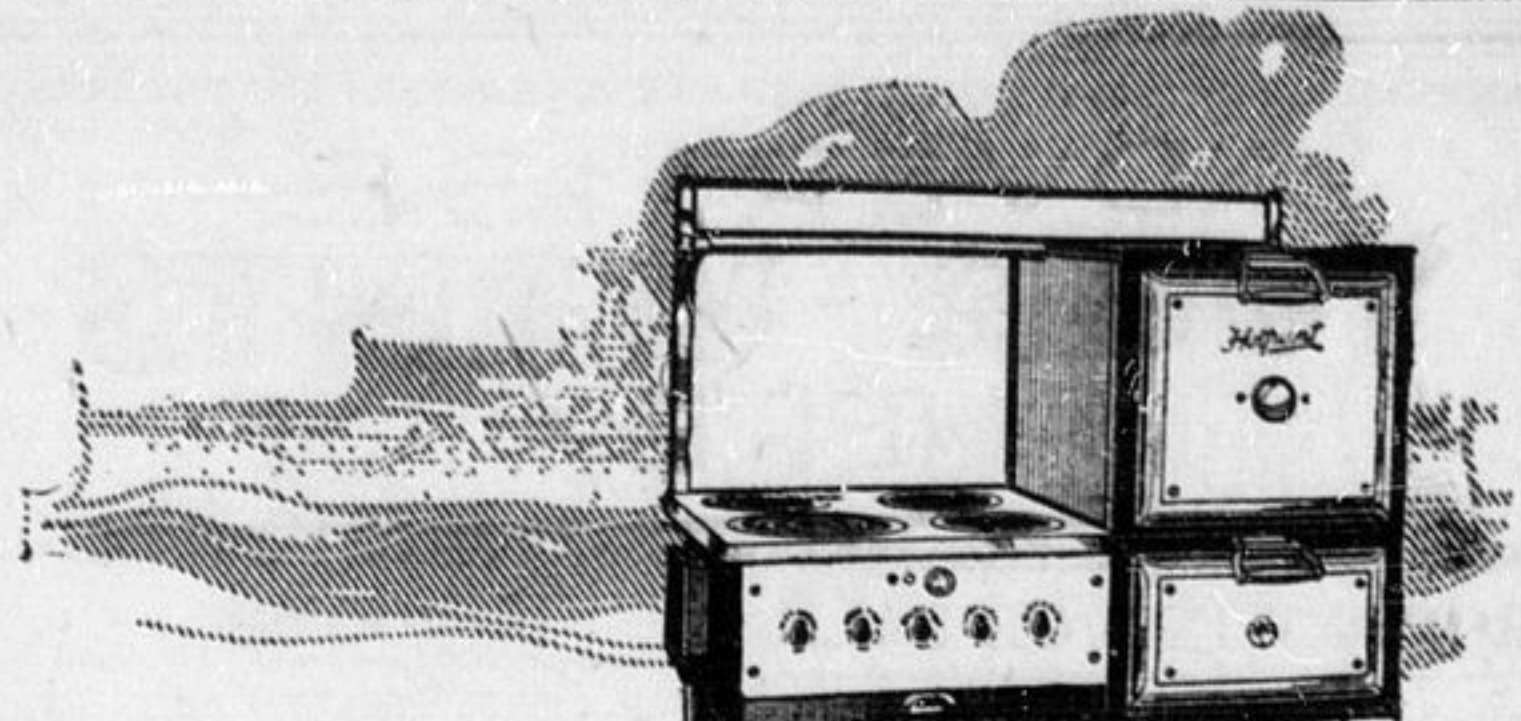
The firm of Hill-Clark-Francis has been awarded the contract for the construction of the new technical school to be built as an addition to the present high school at Timmins. The tender was the lowest received. The contract price is \$120,275.00, which is practically the figure quoted to the town council by the high school board and the advisory vocational committee as the estimated cost of the work. The estimated cost quoted to the council was \$120,000.00. Of the contract price of \$120,275.00 the Ontario Government will pay seventy-five per cent. The Government will also contribute materially to the cost of maintenance of the new technical high school when completed.

The new technical high school will be a very valuable addition to the facilities of the high school. It will not only provide very much needed class-room accommodation, but it will also give pupils an opportunity for specializing in courses other than teaching and the "learned professions" as they are called. Courses will be open in household science, commercial subjects, mechanical (wood-working and iron-working) and mining.

The new addition to the high school building will be approximately 150 by 100 feet. It will include twelve new class-rooms and an auditorium. The structure will be of brick and will be of the latest type with all modern equipment.

Work on the addition will be pushed forward at once. Ground was broken this week for the work of construction. The work is to be completed by Nov. 15th. On that date, at least the building is to be ready for the installation of equipment. The new technical school in connection with the Timmins High School will not be open until January 1st.

The grounds around the high school present a very fine appearance this year. The grass is in particularly fine shape. The enclosing of the tennis courts has made a noteworthy improvement. With the completion of the new addition the Timmins high school and technical school building will be one of the most modern and finest-appearing structures for scholastic purposes in the North Land.
