Arrangements for Match With Touring Team on July 1st. Taken Up at Meeting of N.O.F.A. Last Week.

The meeting of the Council of the Northern Ontario Football Association last Saturday evening was attended by almost all the delegates of the affiliated clubs, and all the executive officers were also present.

The principal business was the making of final arrangements for the International Football game on July 1st, at Timmins, when the Scottish team now touring the dominion will play the pick of Northern Ontario. It was decided to have reserved-seat tickets put on sale at the earliest possible moment, and the secretary was instructed to endeavour to have them ready by the end of this week. The following were appointed the Ticket Committee:—W. A. Field (chairman), George Pond and W. H. Wilson (Timmins), M. Hastie (Kirkland Lake), P. J. Andrew (South Porcupine and Dome Mines), James Bown (Schumacher).

Mr. Maurice Hastie, of Kirkland Lake, was appointed manager of the team to meet the visitors, and Mr. Chas. E. Richards has been placed in charge of all advertising. The transportation of the Scottish team and party from Porquis Junction to Timmins on the day of the game is being looked after by Mr. Andy Roberts and committee.

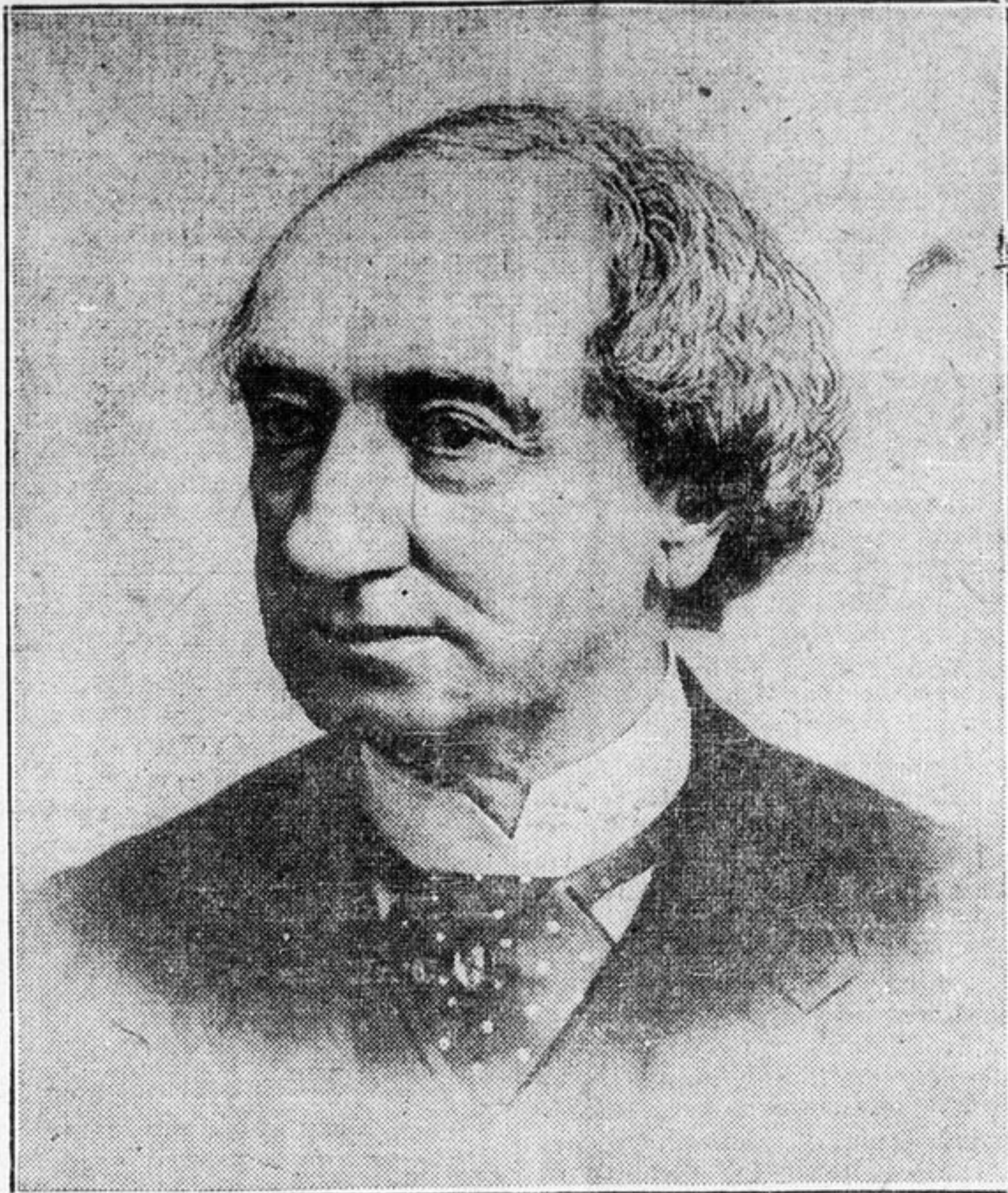
The selection of teams for the trial games will be made this week, and the games will be held in Timmins on June 18th and 25th. After the first trial game there will be a second selection with the object of improving the team, if necessary. The referees appointed for the trial games are Messrs Steve Lynn and Harry Buck. The application of the McIntyre Football Club for affiliation with the N.O.F.A. was accepted, and it was decided to defer the competition of the King Cup until 1928.

SAYS CANADA'S OUTPUT OF
GOLD PASS THAT OF U.S.A.

That gold production in Canada would exceed that of the United States within two years, was the prediction of Draper Dobie in a recent address to the Rotary Club of Buffalo. In 1910, he said, Ontario's gold production was \$40,000. To-day it amounted to \$40,000 every ten hours. The Hollinger Mine handled alone 7,000 tons of ore daily, and had an annual output of \$15,000,000. Discoveries of major importance were being made each year, and it was evident that in another 25 years there would be several gold and other metal mines of equal importance. The proven ore in Canada's nickel supply, if placed in 50-ton cars would reach around the world at the equator, he declared.

The regular meeting of the Caledonian Society will be held in the Hollinger hall on Friday evening. A good programme has been prepared, and all attending may be sure of a good time. The Caledonians in previous years always closed down for the summer months, but this year they intend to hold regular meetings once each month during the summer, instead of every two weeks as heretofore.
