PROMISING RESULTS IN THE KAMISKOTIA AREA

The Northern Miner last week says:—"An encouraging find has been recently made on the property of Mineral Belt Mines Limited, operating a property west of the Noranda group in Kamiskotia area. A vein has been discovered on surface, one foot to eighteen inches wide, of pure sphalerite, showing 40% of zinc and \$3 in gold. Officers and directors of the company are, J. P. McLaughlin, Toronto, president; A. R. Globe, Grimsby, vice-president; J. R. Hastings, Grimsby, secretary-treasurer; F. J. Crawford, J. R. Gordon. Authorized capital is \$300,000 at par value \$1.

Another item in The Miner last week in regard to the Kamiskotia field says—"Development work is being performed on the Desaulniers group of twenty-five claims, in the Kamiskotia area, near the east side of Godfrey township. Three good looking bodies have been traced across two of the claims, varying in width from 25 to 50 feet. The formation is chiefly quartz porphyry and some promising indications have been encountered."

PEMBROKE POLK ENJOYED THEIR VISIT TO TIMMINS

In reference to the recent visit of the Pembroke Kiwanis to Timmins, The Pembroke Standard-Observer in its last issue says:—

"The Pembroke Kiwanians traveled nearly 1,000 miles in their trip, believed to be a record in inter-city visits to attend a luncheon. This fact has been brought to the attention of the District Governor and mention of it is being made in the June issue of the "K-Ray," the Canadian Kiwanis publication.

"Altogether the trip will live long in the memory of those who made it. There were twenty-six in the Pembroke party, and they were joined at North Bay by H. J. Humphrey, General Superintendent of the Lake Superior Division of the C.P.R., with Mrs. Humphrey. There were also other railway officials, but George W. Lee, chairman of the T. & N.O. Commission, was unable to make the trip, although he was present at the North Bay reception. He also was responsible for the Cobalt and Iroquois Falls visit of the travelling Kiwanians, not on the original itinerary. This included a special train to the paper town. "It would be an utter impossibility for them to have done more. Not a thing was overlooked," was the manner in which one Kiwanian put it.

"The ladies in the party "almost fell," for the fake holdup, when a number of Timmins Kiwanians boarded the train a few miles out. They were dressed in true western style and wore masks, stetsons, etc. When a demand for ten cents was made of the men on the train they were at once "hep" to the proceedings, which savored of a Kiwanis fine, but for a fraction of a second the ladies, when asked for their jewelry, were genuinely alarmed, they being not versed.

"The Pembrokeites met scores from the old town now living in the North and without exception all had made good with a vengeance. Fred Kenning, M.L.A. for South Cochrane, boarded the train at South Porcupine, while the host at the hotel where the luncheon was staged in Timmins was none other than T. A. Sammon, of the New Empire Hotel, formerly of the Copeland House. All gave the visitors a true Pembroke welcome."

JUNGLE FOWL TO BE SHOWN AT WORLD'S POULTRY SHOW

It is the assertion of Mrs. O. B. Lacey, of Lucknow, India, who was a recent visitor to Ottawa, that the jungle fowl which is to be included in the Indian national exhibit at the World's Poultry Congress to be held in Ottawa from July 27th to August 4th, will really be the original fowl in its wild state. Mrs. Lacey states that Mrs. A. K. Fawkes, Secretary of the United Provinces Poultry Association, who is in charge of the exhibit, has had a number of these birds snared in the jungles and is bringing them to Ottawa. Poultry keeping has caught on in India during the last few years, Mrs. Lacey states, and she believes that in certain districts the breeding of a fowl such as the White Leghorn might mean just that difference between famine and plenty in a country so often visited by the pangs of hunger.

HON. G. HOWARD FERGUSON SPEAKS OF RED CROSS WEEK

This week the Ontario Red Cross is holding a province-wide campaign for funds, the campaign days being June 7th to 10th, inclusive. The Ontario Government has contributed \$30,000 to the Red Cross work, the value of its peace-time activities being very widely recognized. In regard to the Red Cross, Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, premier of Ontario has issued the following statement:—"The Red Cross Society renders supreme service to humanity. It is the common meeting place of all people and nations who recognize the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of man. In Canada, as we know, the Red Cross Society stands ready to give help and succour wherever and whenever help and succour are needed. Money entrusted to this organization earns priceless dividends and serves to establish and maintain the best and the highest ideals of the race. Both in our densely populated centres and in the remote regions where the advantages of modern life are almost unattainable the Red Cross carries on its helpful work. I earnestly hope that the appeal now being made for funds will meet with a sympathetic response and fully realize the expectations of the Society, which are based on many years of experience of actual needs and have a legitimate claim upon every man, woman and child in this favoured country."

PRINTED NEWSPAPER NOW PUBLISHED FOR ROUYN

Some time ago a couple of enterprising young men issued a newspaper for Rouyn by the mimeographic route. Now, Rouyn has a regularly printed newspaper, and though for the moment it is not printed at Rouyn, it is hoped that it will be in the course of a few weeks, for plant and equipment to this end are now under order. No. 1, Volume 1, of The Rouyn Miner is just to hand, and is bright and newsy. It has twelve pages, size 12 by 16, and there are many items of interest, well written, also a number of attractive illustrations of Rouyn and its mines and other interests. The title, Rouyn Miner, is followed by the words, "On the Spot," and the paper shows that it is also on the job. There is a fair amount of advertising, but it is chiefly out-of-town advertising, there being only twelve Rouyn advertisements, and most of them small ones. If the people of Rouyn really want a newspaper, they will have to give better support than shown in this issue. There is a regular list of editors and officials on the newspaper, these being listed:—H. J. Newman, editor; W. G. Claxton, mining editor; Walter McLoon, local editor; and S. C. Fairn, business manager. It will take more than a small dozen of local advertisers to support a staff like that.

HILL-CLARK-FRANCIS HAVE SEVERAL BIG CONTRACTS

The extended scope of the business carried on by Hill-Clark-Francis, contractors, of New Liskeard and Timmins, is evidenced by the information in the following article from the last issue of The New Liskeard Speaker. Reference is made elsewhere in this issue to the Kapuskasing contract, and last week The Timmins technical school building contract was referred to. The Speaker says:—

"Our town builders and contractors, Messrs Hill-Clark-Francis, were the successful tenderers for large contracts in Kapuskasing and Timmins.

"The work to be done at Kapuskasing consists of the erection of a large hotel, hospital and club-house with central heating plant. The firm's offer and guarantee to complete the work for seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars was accepted. Work is to start right away and two hundred men will be on the job. The work must be completed by the end of 1927.

"The work in Timmins consists of the erection of a technical, or vocational school which evidently is to be a large and quite up-to-date building as the contract price is \$120,000.

"Both buildings will have floors of reinforced concrete. The walls will be of brick and thus an effort will be made to have the buildings as nearly fire-proof as is practicable.

"Fifty men will commence soon on the Timmins contract.

"This firm will also erect in New Liskeard dwelling houses for Mrs. Lorne Kennedy and Mr. George White. They have also tendered for the erection of another fine New Liskeard residence, but more about this later.

Messrs Hill-Clark-Francis will do much of the machine work for these outside contracts in New Liskeard for they have in some particulars the most complete plant of the kind in Canada. If they hear of any new invention in machinery which they could use to advantage, they order it at once, and thus keep just a little ahead of any other manufacturing and building firms.

"It may be seen that two of the contracts above mentioned amount to a total of \$870,000.

The New Liskeard Speaker last week says:—"A Toronto daily recently tells of the havoc among hollyhocks due to this past winter's frost. It seems a great many hollyhocks were totally destroyed. This cannot be said of hollyhocks in this neighborhood as they have weathered the winter in very good shape."

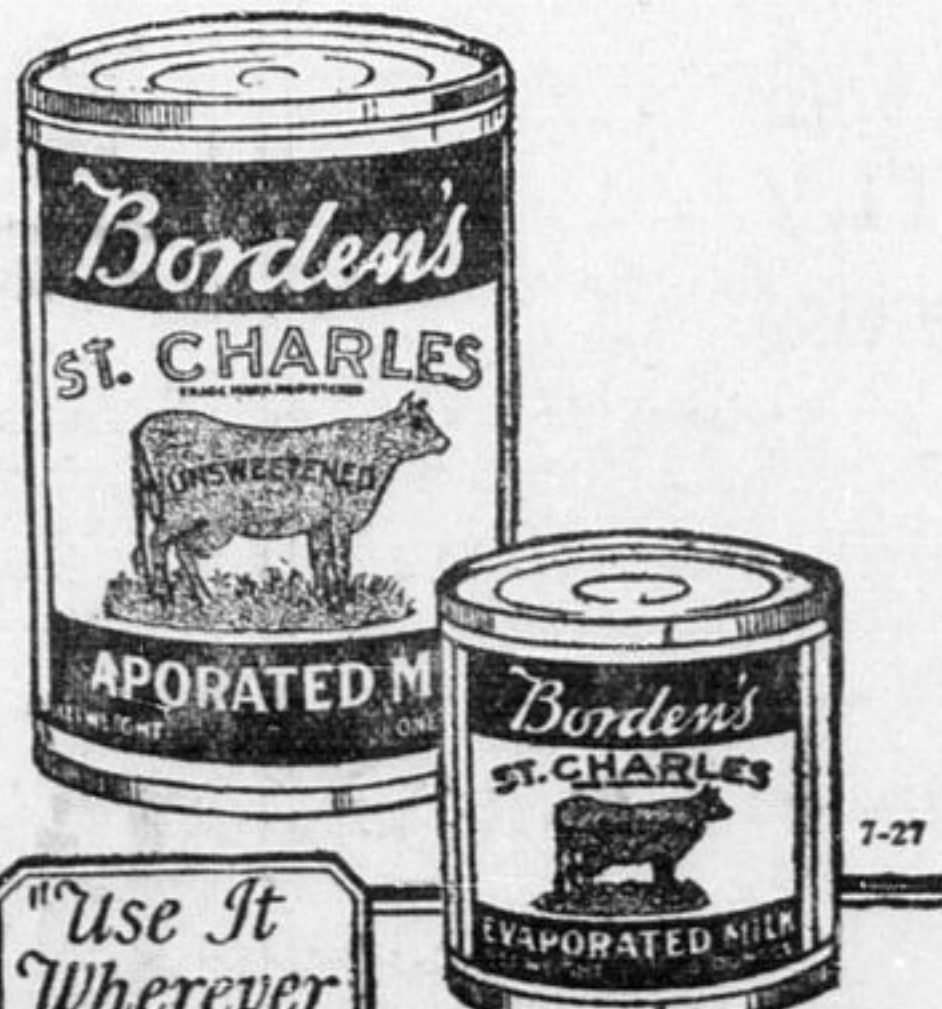
