WILD GEESSE CARED FOR AT TIMMINGS RECENTLY

The Canadian Forest and Outdoors, the journal of the Canadian Forestry Association, in its June issue out this week, carries the following paragraph:—
"At Timmings, Ont., a few days ago, when Jack Miner's geese were on migration to their nesting and rearing ground at Hudson Bay eighty-four of these geese temporarily rested on the marshy grounds in the rear of the Hollinger gold mines power house. Members of the Porcupine Rod and Rod Club immediately put out corn and the birds fed on it. The birds were so tame that upwards of 300 citizens of the town of Timmings observed them feeding at twenty feet. They expect to create a sanctuary there in due course. A gunner shot three of the geese and was immediately gaoled. Next day he was fined \$75.00 and costs."

CAR MAY BE SECURED FOR WORK OF V.O.N. NURSE HERE

Plans are under way for the securing of a car for the work of the Victorian Order Nurse at Timmings. The long distance in town to be travelled and the consequent loss of time and effort have proven a handicap to the work of the nurse, Miss Elliott. The committee have felt that a car would be a very profitable investment from the standpoint of efficiency and time saving, but they could not see their way clear from the financial standpoint. Last week, however, Mr. A. Laprairie submitted a plan for securing the necessary funds for the purchase of a car, and the committee naturally said, "Go ahead." According, chances are good that the required car will be available at a comparatively early date, and the nurse will be able to handle many more calls with less effort.

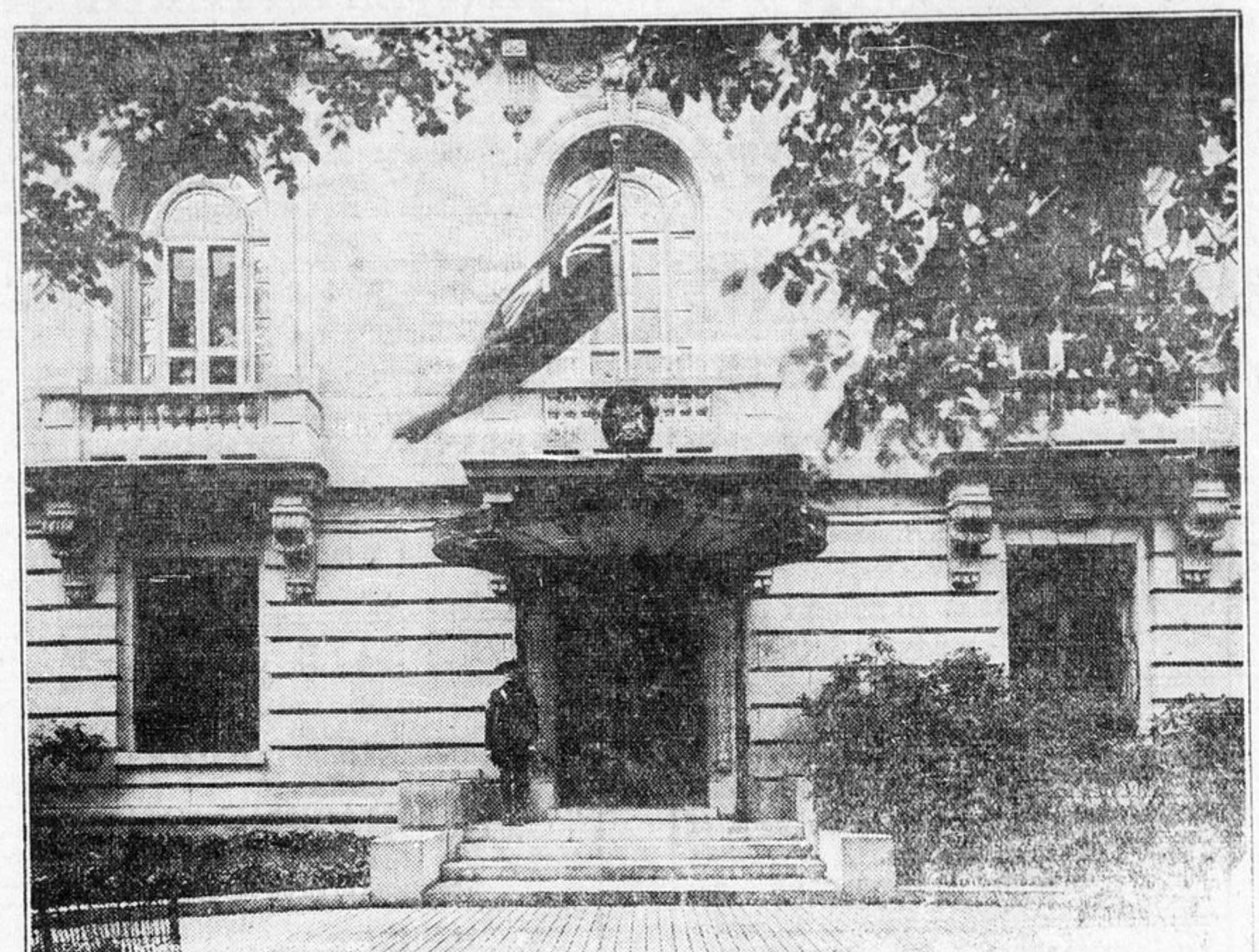
