PORCUPINE MINES MILLED 848,610 TONS IN QUARTER

Production of Gold Greater Than Last Year for First Three Months of this Year.

The returns for the first quarter of 1927 for the production of minerals in Ontario, as just issued by the provincial Government shows that the production of gold from all sources was nearly \$100,000 in advance of the corresponding quarter in 1926. There were 101,305 more tons milled in the Porcupine than for the first quarter of last year. Owing to mill enlargements, shaft-shiking and construction work, the increase in production was smaller than it would otherwise have been. The figures were 371,005.5 fine ounces, valued at \$7,670,127 in 1927, as against 366,472.7 fine ounces worth \$7,575,114 in the previous year.
