The Timmins Masonic Order at-

**ASSAULT ON BOY COSTS  
COBALT MAN OVER \$1500**

At Cobalt last week Magistrate At-  
kinson gave his decision in the case of  
Mike Gleason, Cobalt, who was con-  
victed three weeks ago on a charge of  
wounding a ten-year-old boy, Roger  
Emden, with a pair of scissors. When  
the conviction was registered, sen-  
tence was deferred. On Saturday  
last Gleason was ordered to pay \$1500  
and costs to the extent of \$97.50, in  
connection with the case. Gleason is  
to provide bonds of \$1000.00 to ap-  
pear within a year. The Emden boy  
was badly injured under the armpit  
while being dragged by Gleason to  
the latter's house. It appears that  
some boys were annoying Gleason by

throwing snowballs at the side of his  
house and firing off a toy pistol on  
his verandah. Gleason had been cut-  
ting his own boy's hair and when the  
boys had troubled him for some time,  
he rushed out, thoughtlessly carrying  
the scissors in his hand, according to  
the evidence. He saw young Emden  
standing nearby and took it for grant-  
ed that he was one of the boys who  
had been creating the trouble. Gleason  
must accidentally have punctured the  
boy's arm pit underneath the left arm.  
The boy is now in the hospital, medi-  
cal and surgical treatment being  
necessary to preserve his health. He  
has not yet regained the full use of  
his arm.

**TIME EXTENSION ASKED ON  
CLAIMS AT WOMAN LAKE**
