THOUSAND PEOPLE TO TAKE PART IN THE MOTOR TREK

Big Programme for Entertainment of Visitors Being Planned in Toronto by Government and City.

Mr. Alec M. Dewar, president of the Northern Ontario Associated Boards, has furnished The Advance with further particulars of the motor trip from the North to the South.

Details of the plans in regard to the motor trip from Northern Ontario to Toronto will be issued in a few days. The trip from this part of the North will start from Cochrane, although cars from Smooth Rock Falls, Kapuskasing, etc., will take part. All the towns down the line will join in. About 100 cars have planned for the trip. In all there will be some 250 cars with 4 to a car, making 1000 people in all.

It is not the intention to have the cars travel together, but either singly or in small groups. The date of Northern Ontario Day at the National Exhibition has been fixed for Sept. 7. This is the plan of the Hon. Wm. Finlayson who originated the idea. The procession will reach Toronto at noon on the 6th. The night before will be in the neighbourhood of Orillia and Barrie. From there the motorists will be formed into procession, headed by Police, Board of Trade cars, Motor League cars, etc. All the cars will carry a banner marking them plainly from Northern Ontario, and each member of the party will have an individual badge.

An exact programme of the trip has not been finally decided on but will include luncheons, a dinner, a couple of receptions and perhaps a moon light trip on the lake. The Government, the Board of Trade, the Motor League, the City and the Exhibition have made very elaborate plans for the entertainment of the delegates. In addition to the official programme the government has arranged that any cars who wish to visit Niagara Falls, the Agricultural College or any other point, by notifying their own Northern Ontario Committee, will have full arrangements made for police attention, parking spaces and guides.

As far as accommodation in Toronto is concerned, many of those going will stay with friends. Others will go to hotels, and these will have to make their own arrangements or reservations. Others again will want to go to boarding houses. This is being arranged by the Northern Committee. Each man who hands in his name before that date will be given a boarding house where he can stay at reasonable rates. Others who take tents along, will be provided with camping places.

Another feature of the arrangement which is very important is the arrangements for eating and sleeping on the journey. The central committee in the North is making a canvass of the places along the road where meals or beds can be obtained, and each person in the party will be given a card showing where he should stay, where to stop for each meal, where to stop for bed and so on. In this way no one going need have the slightest worry either about sleeping or eating accommodations.

A meeting will be arranged within the next few days when the details in connection with the trip will be definitely arranged.
