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South Porcupine Stands High In Entrance Examinations

First and Second Place in the Inspectorate Won by South End Youngsters. All Pupils Pass, Fifteen with Honours. Dome and Porcupine Also Show Well. Vacation School at United Church.

The Vacation School of the United Church is in full swing this week, there being over seventy present today. Miss Quick, Deaconess, of Timmins, comes out each day and a number of the townspeople are also assisting Mr. Baine, among them being Mrs.

Dowzer, Mrs. F. C. Evans, Misses Rapsay, Gibbons, Chilvers, Dowzer and Mesdames R. Mandley and F. Hamilton. The children are very interested in their work which consists of memory gems, stories, needlecraft for the girls and carpentry for the boys. Only children from four to twelve years are admitted and they must be present for all the exercises, not just come for the part that appeals to them most. On Friday there will be a special session in the afternoon when a Confederation pageant will be presented and when parents and friends will be welcomed and shown the handwork of the children. A collection will be taken on Friday to defray the cost of materials required for the school.

Great interest was taken in the Entrance to High School examination results here this week. The South Porcupine public school has been noted for the standing its pupils have taken in past years but this year they excelled even their past records, having produced pupils that attained both first and second places in the inspectorate. Three times this school has had the first place and at other times second place has been taken, but when little Kathleen Gallagher came first and Earle Hamilton second greater enthusiasm than ever was shown for the work of our school. These two children were only eleven years old Kathleen being two months the younger of the two. During the past two years, one year in Mrs. Colborne's room and one in the Entrance class in Miss Shaw's room, it has been an interesting inch-by-inch race between these two children for first place on their monthly honour roll, at times there being only one mark between them but those interested hardly dared hope, owing to their age, that they would take the same standing in the whole inspectorate that they were taking in their own class. But once again is the thoroughness and splendid ability of Miss Shaw in the Entrance work exemplified. Credit is also due Mrs. Colborne (now retired to Windsor) for the careful preparation she gave her pupils before they were passed on for the last year's hard grind at the Entrance, several others taking honours that had only passed out of her room a year ago. Mr. C. V. Gallagher, reeve of Tisdale, could scarcely credit the fact that his little daughter had taken first place so he phoned

Inspector Marlin at Cochrane to have it confirmed before wiring the happy news to Kathleen where she is holidaying at Hastings. We are all proud of Kathleen and congratulate her and hope the same success will follow her work in High School. Master Earle, is the oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. F. J. Hamilton and has been one of the live Advance newsboys, during his whole year having sold his forty-five or fifty papers every week on Connaught Hill and district, rain or shine. He also has never missed one hour of school since he started last September. These two children are the youngest to have ever taken this standing in this part of the North, Kathleen not being twelve until September. The fact that they are children that have been systematically sent to bed early and not allowed out on the streets evenings, may have been no small factor in enabling them to do the work they have done. But the greatest credit goes to Miss Shaw for the wonderful interest she takes in her pupils, all of the twenty-eight from here having passed, fifteen with honours, and we are proud of her, proud of our boys and girls, and proud of our school. Dome School also made a good showing, there being nine honours and no failures from there. All the pupils from Golden City passed, too, their share of honours being obtained by A. Rein and J. Young. We are glad to notice the name of Bertha Biree of Connaught among the successful ones. Bertha was formerly a resident here.

McINTYRES WIN LOCAL FINALS FOR ONTARIO CUP

Home and Home Matches Now with Kirkland Lake to Decide Northern Ontario Honours.

The McIntyre football team won the Porcupine District finals in the Ontario Cup series on Tuesday evening by defeating the Thistles by a score of 3 to 1.

Again, combination play won the McIntyre the right to play further in the Cup series. There was no doubt from the beginning that if the McIntyres kept up their combination they would win from the Thistles. Their goal was not in danger during the first half. When the ball did come down it was either cleared or kicked wide by the backs. The Maes played for an opening all the time. Leonard played a remarkable game in goal for the Thistles.

For the first five minutes the ball went from end to end, the backs clearing well. The Thistles came down on the right and Rudkin tried to score with three men waiting for a pass. The McIntyre went down in combination and McLatchie passed. Barron tried to score, but the ball struck the upright and rolled across the goalmouth with no one to touch it in. The Thistles came down and this time Cooper tried to dribble the leather into the goal, instead of passing, and he was robbed. The McIntyre seemed to have it much their own way for a time, and Leonard had to save two fine shots. The Maes would not give up and forced a corner. Bratby sent in a nice centre and Dougall headed in for first score. The Thistles came down again and Rudkin again tried to score instead of passing. At the other end Barron received a pass and tried to twist it into an open goal before he was in a good position to shoot and the ball went wide. This half finished with McIntyre one up.

At the commencement of the second half McIntyre came down. Moore passed to Barron; the latter centered but Dougall kicked over. Moore got the goal kick and sent it to Cran, but Cadman cleared before Cran could get

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his feet to it. At the other end the Thistles forced a corner which Cooper kicked out. Cooper went down again and centred to Carroll and Johnston cleared. Cooper repeated the play and Carroll had a good chance to score but Parker was too quick for him. The Thistles seemed to be unable to get out of their half of the field. Leonard made a fine save of a shot from Morris. Morris put another to Cran who got through with only Leonard to beat but he was tripped. This time Dougall sent the penalty shot over on purpose. Morris was playing a whale of a game and sent in another, but Leonard saved. At the McIntyre end Cooper sent in a nice corner kick but Rudkin booted it over. Chymes sent another into the goalmouth and Parker fisted out. Doyle took a corner kick. It was a dandy and Parker did well to save.

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The leather came back again and Leonard fisted over Barron's shot. Cadman went down taking Cooper's place after the latter had walked off the field for the second time. Alex shot a dandy but it was just too wide. Leonard saved a couple of dandy shots. The Thistles tried hard to score and Parker made a nice save from Alex Cadman's shot. Right after, Rudkin got a goal from a close-in. Two minutes from the end the McIntyre got another penalty through H. Rankin accidentally handling. Moore shot and scored. Right after Alex sent a free kick skying over the bar.
