

The North Land now has a good and miskicked. All the McIntyre Montreal, from which port they will list of fall fairs, any or all of them well worth visiting. They indicate the growth of agricultural development in the North Land. Among those listed for this year are the following:-Charlton, Sept. 15th; Clute. Sept. 21st; Cochrane, Sept. 14th and 15th; Englehart, Sept. 16th and 17th; Kapuskasing, Sept. 16th and 17th; Matheson, Sept. 21; New Liskeard, Sept. 22-24; North Bay, Sept. 14-16; Porcupine, (Golden City), Sept. 14th;

Porquis Junction, Sept. 14th. Probably the two dates will not conflict, but many will feel that it would be better if the Porcupine Fair and the Porquis Junction Fair had not happened to fall on the same day. Many may want to see them both as they are among the good fairs of the North and both deserve all encouragement. The North Land has had its distances much reduced by the roads and the autos, and accordingly there is a wider range of interest in the districts. However, Sept. 14th is the date of both the Porcupine and the Porquis Junction fairs as many as can should attend one or both of them.

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
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
