Seventh Annual Regatta at the Mattagami River, Aug. 1

Programme of Events for Civic Holiday Aquatic Sports on Monday. Good List of Prizes. Outboard Motor Canoe Races Featured. Event Under Auspices of Timmins Citizens' Band.

Arrangements are now about complete for the seventh annual regatta at the Mattagami river landing, under the auspices of the Timmins Citizens' Band. The Band has kept up this feature the only big day of aquatic sports put on in the town each year. This year among the most popular features are the outboard motor canoe races. For the 4 h.p. outboard motor canoe race a handsome silver cup has been donated by the Geo. Taylor Hardware Co. This cup was on display in the window of the Taylor Hardware Co. and is attracting considerable attention. An equally handsome cup for the 2½ h.p. outboard motor canoe race has been given by Marshall-Ecclestone, Limited. There will be good prizes as usual for all the other events, and this year as in past years the regatta is sure to prove a pleasing one. To defray the expenses of the occasion tags are sold before and on the day of

the event, so the Band is depending upon the goodwill of the public to make the day a financial success.

The programme for the events was issued this week. Following the plan of previous years it is intended to follow this programme throughout as to times and events.

The following is the full list of events as outlined on the programme:

2.00 p.m.—Boys' foot race, 50 yards, under 10 years; 1st and 2nd prizes.

2.05 p.m.—Girls' foot races, 50 yards, under 10 years; 1st and 2nd prizes.

2.10 p.m.—Boys' double canoe race, under 17 years; half mile; 1st and 2nd prizes.

2.20—Boys' swimming race, under 17 years; 50 yards; 1st and 2nd prizes.

2.30—Ladies' double canoe race; quarter mile; 1st and 2nd (4 prizes).

2.40—Men's single canoe race; half mile; 1st and 2nd prizes.

2.50—Chasing the duck; the winner gets the duck.

3.00—Ladies' swimming race, 50 yards; 1st and 2nd prizes.

3.10—Men's double canoe race; one mile; 1st and 2nd (4 prizes).

3.20—Men's diving contest, 1st and 2nd prizes.

3.30—Mixed double canoe race; half mile; 1st and 2nd (4 prizes).

3.45—Outboard motor canoe race, 4 h.p.; silver cup given by the Geo. Taylor Hardware Co. One prize only.

4.00—Outboard motor canoe race, 2½ h.p.; silver cup given by the Marshall-Ecclestone Hardware Co. One prize only.

4.15—Men's swimming race, 80 yards; 1st and 2nd prizes.

4.25—Underwater swim. Last man up. 1st and 2nd prizes.

4.40—Crab canoe race, single, 50 yards; 1st and 2nd prizes.

4.50—Men's swimming race, 880 yards; 1st and 2nd prizes.

5.00—Greasy pole contest; one prize.

5.30—Canoe tilting; 1st and 2nd prizes.

In all events where there are first and second prizes, there must be three or more entries or only the one prize will be given.

The prizes for the event will be on display in one of the windows before the event.

HOLLINGER AND McINTYRE WINNERS DURING WEEK

Tuesday's Game in the P.D.F.L. Had Abrupt Ending While Players Argued With Referee.

Two more matches were played in the past week in the P.D.F.L. series. The Hollinger won from the Cornish on Thursday last, and on Tuesday of this week the McIntyre defeated the Thistles, the score being 2 to 1. The latter match had an abrupt ending while the players stood arguing with the referee.

Thursday's match was a fine one, and both teams played well, especially considering the fact that it is nearly six weeks since they played previously. The Hollinger played a nice combination game and won on merit, while the Cornish put up a stiff defence, but the latter failed in the finishing touches. During the first half of this match there were some nasty remarks thrown by a spectator to a Cornish player. For a time it looked as if the player might be tempted to start something, but like a good sport he held his head despite the provocation. It is understood that the spectator will be brought before the committee to be dealt with for his unsportsmanlike conduct.

The first goal was a very nice one. Pedderson got the leather and brought it down and centered and Gustavson scored off the play. The Cornish pressed and got close in, when Strong accidentally handled the ball. A penalty was awarded and Hignman evened the score for the Cornish. Good play ensued and before the half finished Pedderson made a fine dribble and scored on his own play, putting the Hollinger ahead at half-time.

The second half was much better than the first and both goalies put in some good work, Perkins being especially good. Toms at outside left for the Hollinger was in good form and got in lot of good centres, but the backs of the Cornish played well and kept the leather out. The only goal scored in the half came by a pass from Toms to Landers, who scored with a nice shot. The Cornish tried hard to bring down the score but Kjenstad and Loberg intercepted well and kept them out.

Tuesday's match was not up to the football mark being marred by the refereeing. There were two decisions that did not look good. One was the penalizing of the Thistles when the ball struck Rankin in the back, a free kick being awarded. The other was near the finish when the Thistles were all out to equalize. Parker caught the ball and fell on it. The Thistles stood and looked on when one of the McIntyre men pushed Carroll over him and the referee awarded a free kick for the McIntyre and ordered Carroll off the field for bad language which the players claimed had not been uttered. From the spectators' point of view a bounced ball would have met the situation more fairly.

The McIntyre scored in the first two minutes of the match, and in twenty minutes they got their second counter which was an easy one when Leonard ran out of his goal to clear and miskicked. All the McIntyre needed to do was to tip it in. The rest of the half was slow with a few bright spots. There was frequent blowing of the whistle for small infringement of the rules.

NORTH LAND'S GROWING LIST OF GOOD FALL FAIRS

The North Land now has a good list of fall fairs, any or all of them well worth visiting. They indicate the growth of agricultural development in the North Land. Among those listed for this year are the following:—Charlton, Sept. 15th; Clute, Sept. 21st; Cochrane, Sept. 14th and 15th; Englehart, Sept. 16th and 17th; Kapuskasing, Sept. 16th and 17th; Matheson, Sept. 21; New Liskeard, Sept. 22-24; North Bay, Sept. 14-16; Porcupine, (Golden City), Sept. 14th; Porquis Junction, Sept. 14th.

Probably the two dates will not conflict, but many will feel that it would be better if the Porcupine Fair and the Porquis Junction Fair had not happened to fall on the same day. Many may want to see them both as they are among the good fairs of the North and both deserve all encouragement. The North Land has had its distances much reduced by the roads and the autos, and accordingly there is a wider range of interest in the districts. However, Sept. 14th is the date of both the Porcupine and the Porquis Junction fairs as many as can should attend one or both of them.

Other fairs that people here may be interested in will include:—Toronto, Canadian National Exhibition, Aug. 27th to Sept. 12th; Bracebridge, Sept. 20-22; London, Sept. 10th to 17th; Ottawa, Aug. 22nd to 27th; Royal Winter Fair, Toronto, Nov. 16th, to 24th; Guelph Winter Fair, Dec. 5th to 8th.
