No. 2-A to L-Public School, purposes within the powers of the Council, and being for the benefit of P.S.D. No. 2-M to Z-Public School, the ratepayers, the Township of Tis-

of Canada. AND WHEREAS it is deemed advisable to issue \$100,000. of debentures and apply the proceeds thereof upon such indebtedness.

AND WHEREAS it is therefore P.S.D. No. 4-A to Z-Belanger Store necessary to borrow on the credit of the Corporation at large, the said sum of \$100,000. and to issue debentures therefor bearing interest at the rate of five and one-half (5½) per centum per annum, the amount of the debt intended to be created by this By-law.

AND WHEREAS it is desirable to make the said debt payable in twenty (20) annual instalments during the period of twenty (20) years of such amounts respectively, that the aggregate amount of principal and interest in each year shall be as nearly as possible the same.

AND WHEREAS it will be necessary to raise in each year in which an instalment becomes due, the sum of \$8,367.93.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rateable property of the Municipality, according to the last revised Assessment Roll, is, \$3,575,-966.00.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the existing debenture debt exclusive of local improvements, is \$686,010.63 and no part of the principal or in- is a tenant whose lease extends for the terest thereof is in arrear.

THEREFORE, the Municipal Counship of Tisdale enacts as follows:-

1. That for the purpose mentioned in the preamble hereto, there shall be borrowed on the credit of the Corporation at large, the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) ment rates. and debentures shall be issued in sums of not less than One Hundred Dollars (100) each bearing interest at the rate of five and one-half (51/2) per centum per annum, payable yearly, and having coupons attached thereto for the payment of the said interest.

2. The debentures shall all bear the same date, shall be issued within two (2) years after the date on which this By-law is passed and may bear any date within such two (2) years, and shall be payable in twenty (20) annual instalments during the twenty (20) years next after the date when they shall be issued, and the respective amounts of principal and interest payable in each of such years shall be as set out in Schudule "A" attached hereto, which is hereby declared to be and form a part of this By-law.

3. The said debentures, as to both principal and interest, shall be expressed in Canadian currency, and may be payable at any place or places

in Canada.

4. The Reeve of the Corporation shall sign and issue the debentures and interest coupons, which shall also be signed by the Treasurer of the Notice of Registration of By-Law. Corporation, and shall be sealed with the seal of the Corporation.
