

Secretary of Mining Association Touches on Many Interesting Matters Relative to Mining.

Mr. G. C. Bateman, secretary of the Ontario Mining Association, recently addressed the Montreal branch of the Canadian Mining Institute. The banquet was held in the Engineers' Club, Montreal, and Mr. Bateman's subject was "Mining as a Permanent Indus-

One of the points especially stressed by Mr. Bateman was that Canada has one of the greatest undeveloped mineral areas in the world.

The great area in Northern Ontario to which the speaker referred contains 2,600,000 square miles, of which only seven per cent. has been exploited, he said. This small proportion of the stores of oreh as, he stated, so far produced a billion dollars worth of metals.

Discussing the permanency of mining as an industry, Mr. Bateman traced the part played in history by metals, and showed that the desire for them, particularly the precious metals, has been the driving force of conquest, colonization and national development throughout the ages. In Northern Ontario and Quebec, conquest has been only of nature, and has led to settlement and the establishment of big industries. "A little over twenty years ago," he said, "Northern Ontario was practically an unknown wilderness. Today it is the centre of a large and growing industry. The value of the metallic production there last year was about \$60,000,000, an increase of \$10,000,000 over the preced-

"In northwestern Quebec the best organized and the most intensive scientific prospecting the world has ever seen is being done," the speaker asserted. "The northern country might lie dormant for many generations if it were not for the exploitation of mineral deposits."

Other speakers were Dr. J. B. Porter, of McGill University, Major G. G. Ommanney, of the C.P.R., C. Price-Green, of the C.N.R. Major Wheatley spoke of the Empire Metallurgical Congress opening at Montreal this month, to which at least a thousand delegates from all over the Empire are expected to come.


