**FINALS ON SATURDAY FOR
GOLF CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP**

Contenders. Winners of the
Trophy in Previous Years.

This Saturday afternoon the final
match in the Golf Club Trophy com-
petition will be played, when Messrs
Geo. Lake and G. S. Lowe compete for
the championship of the Timmins Golf
Club. The match will start at 2.30
p.m. This is Mr. Lowe's first appear-
ance in the list of contenders who
were not eliminated before the finals.
Mr. Lake was the runner-up in 1922.

The Golf Club Trophy is the oldest
of the local club's trophies and was
won first in 1920 by Mr. R. Lily. The
following year, 1921, Mr. V. H. Emery
defeated J. W. Fogg in the finals and
was acknowledged the champion for
that year. In 1922 Messrs J. Sullivan
and Geo. Lake were the contenders,
Mr. Sullivan winning out. The fol-
lowing year, 1923, P. E. Cooper, of
Schumacher, won from Mr. J. H. Ba-
con. In 1924 Dr. H. H. Moore and
the late Mr. W. H. Wylie were the
contenders, Dr. Moore being the win-
ner. In 1925 Mr. J. A. MacDonald
won from Mr. J. H. Bacon. Last year
Mr. H. C. Garner defeated Mr. V. H.
Emery, a former holder of the trophy.
The match on Saturday should be
of great interest to local golfers.

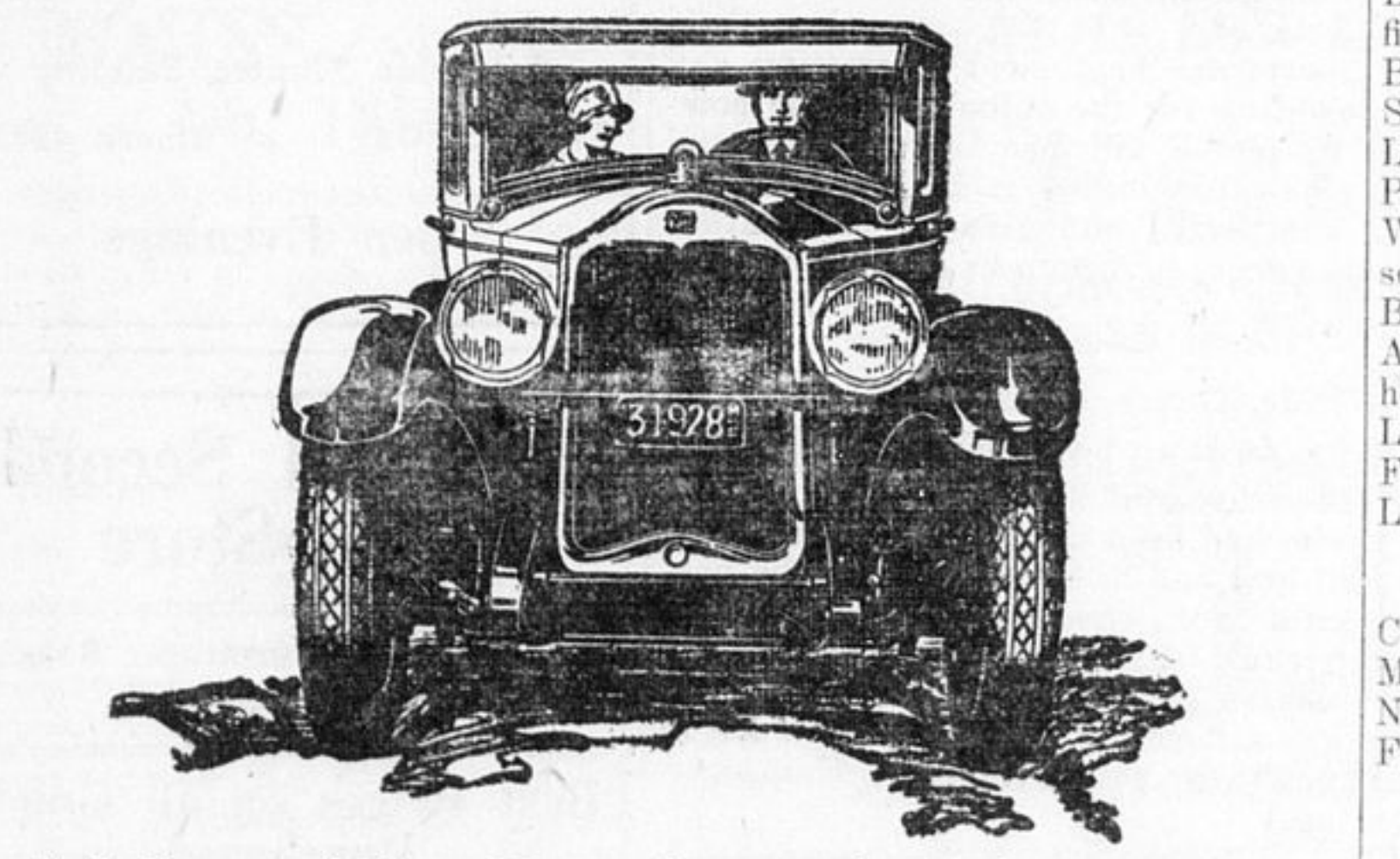

**TWENTY-SIX POUND TROUT
CAUGHT NEAR LATCHFORD**

A Timmins young man who spent
his vacation this summer at Latchford

fish go, his ideas are more or less sup-
ported by the story of a big trout
caught some days ago near Latchford.
The fish tipped the scales at 26 pounds
according to the fisherman, Bill Ham-
merstrom and E. Currey, of Cobalt.
They declare that they hooked the
trout while out in their canoe in a
fairly rough sea, and that fifteen min-
utes elapsed before they were able to
bring their catch into their craft.

out 290 feet of line in making the cap-
ture. Going over the same section of
the lake shortly afterwards they land-
ed a twelve-pounder, but later efforts
