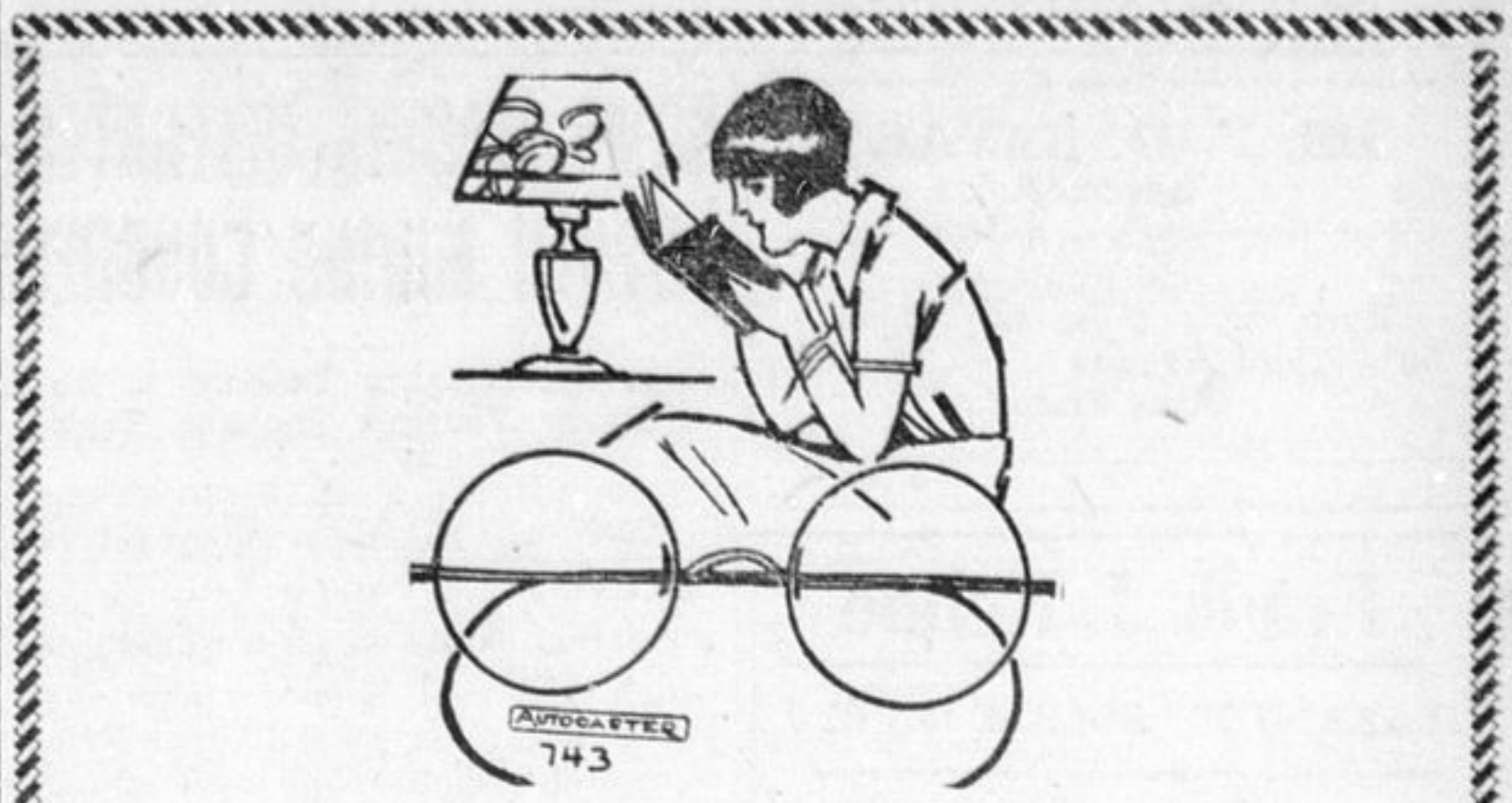
## ANNUAL HORTICULTURAL SHOW HERE ON LABOUR DAY

## BIG FINNISH PICNIC TO BE HELD ON AUGUST 28

Competing Teams Expected from Sudbury and Kirkland Lake. Big Programme of Sports

The Finnish people of the district have a well-deserved reputation for successful and pleasing picnics and sports days. For August 28th they are putting on another big picnic that is expected to outclass even the best of their previous successes. The event will commence at 12.30 sharp on Aug. 28th, at the Finnish-Ukrainian picnic grounds at the Mattagami river. A big programme of sports, athletics and novelties will be enjoyed. There will be 1500-metre races, 5000-metre races, relay races, broad jump, high jump, javelin throwing, as well as the usual run of races and other events for men, women and children. Competing teams are expected to be here from Sudbury and Kirkland Lake, and it is expected that each event will see the very keenest competition. In their sports days the Finnish people feature athletic events demanding high physical training and condition of the competitors. They specialize in racing, jumping, throwing the javelin and similar events where individual strength and training are essential. The ordinary sports day is usually largely devoted to games such as football, baseball, softball, etc. Not so with the sports of the Finnish people, who go in more for races, strength tests, etc. At the same time their sports are kept most interesting and exciting for the onlookers. The coming picnic will also feature the usual picnic pleasures. A large attendance is expected and given good weather the event is sure to be another big success.
