SUGGESTS CONSIDERATION OF LENGTH OF TOURNAMENT

Writing from Bestel, Ont., the mine office of the Castle-Trethewey Mine, Mr. Angus Campbell suggests a change in the length of the annual golf tournament for Northern Ontario.

"I certainly enjoyed my day's golf," he writes, "and I think everybody else did too. I had not played the course at Timmins for two years, and was much pleased with the improvements that have been made on it. The Timmins golfers gave us a mighty fine time, and the tournament arrangements were good. Timmins was, I understand, rather disappointed with the small number who attended, only two being present from the two Sudbury clubs, five from North Bay, and five from Haileybury. Iroquois Falls and Timmins were well represented. The three days' length of tournament was, I think, responsible for the small outside attendance. Starting play on Thursday, which means leaving North Bay and Haileybury Wednesday, on Tuesday if one wished a practice day, meant about a week for golf,—too much for busy North Country men. Friday and Saturday golf with a chance to return home on Sunday for business Monday is, think, the limit. Timmins and Iroquois Falls will realize this if the tournament at North Bay next year is for the same days as this year, and I think that only a few will go down when the time comes. It was felt by some last year that the two days at Haileybury, with only 18 holes of qualifying play, was too short to be fair to the players. However, time presses in golf, as in all things. If three days is considered really necessary the few left for the final day's play could better stay over for Monday than could the majority be on hand for Thursday."

Many other golfers take an opposite view to Mr. Campbell, some favouring an even longer duration of the tournament. "A week's good golf is not too much," is one of their arguments. However, as Mr. Campbell suggests, the opinions of the various clubs in the matter will be of interest. "I would like to see some argument on the subject," he says.
