Be Sure That Your Name is on the Voters List This Year

Lists Now Open for Inspection. Over 4,000 Voters on the Lists This Year. Only a Small Number on Part II. Fortythree Different Post Offices Used by the Timmins Voters.

Every year there are people who make considerable complaint and feel greatly aggrieved because they find themselves at municipal election time without a vote. Of course, there is no use in making any howl about names being left off the voters' list in December or January. The time to see about the matter is right now. At this time errors or oversights may be corrected. Now is the time to see if your name is on the list. If it is not on, you can take the necessary steps to have it added, and you will have the right to vote, with everybody ac-

tually pleased. No one desires to keep any voter off the list. Unless you are careless or indifferent now about the matter, you can be certain of the vote. See that your name is on the list!

The voters' list for the town of Timmins has just been published, having been duly posted up in the clerk's office on Thursday last and the required number of copies sent to those required by law. There is a copy of the list also at the post office, where anyone may consult it and see that he or she is duly entered on the list if entitled to vote.

In the 1927 voters' list of the town of Timmins there are 4,630 names. Of this number, 3,948 are in part I, entitled to vote at both municipal elections and elections for the Legislative Assembly, while 82 are in part II, entitled to vote at municipal elections only. The voters by polling sub-divisions for part I are as follows:

Polling sub-division No. 1—being that part of the town composed of: North side of Fourth avenue between Spruce north and T. & N. O. Railway; Fifth avenue between Spruce north and T. & N. O. Railway; Sixth avenue between Spruce north and Toke street; James avenue; John avenue; east side of Spruce street north from Tamarack street; Henlock street; Toke street, and Lake Shore road;—290 voters, and 13 more on part II.

Sub-division No. 2—North side of Third avenue between Cedar and Spruce streets north; Fourth, Fifth and Sixth avenues between Cedar and Spruce streets north; east side of Cedar street between Third avenue and northerly town limit; Pine street north and west side of Spruce street between Third avenue and northerly town limits;—258 names in part I, and 10 in part II.

Sub-division No. 3—North side of Third avenue between Birch and Cedar streets; Fourth, Fifth and Sixth avenues between Birch and

Cedar streets north; the east side of Birch street north between Third avenue and northerly town limits; Balsam street north and the west side of Cedar street north between Third avenue and northerly town limits;—274 names on part I, and 6 on part II.

Sub-division No. 4—North side of Third avenue between Mountjoy and Birch streets; Fourth avenue, Fifth avenue and Sixth avenue, between Elm street north and Cedar street north; east side of Mountjoy street north between Third and Hollinger avenues; Elm street north, Maple street north and west side Birch street north between Third avenue and northerly town limits;—283 names on part I, and 6 on part II.

Polling sub-division No. 5—North side of Hollinger avenue between Waterloo road and centre of block east of Mountjoy street north; Messines avenue between Waterloo road and Mountjoy north; Cambrai avenue, Mons avenue, Borden avenue and Laurier avenue between Waterloo road and Mountjoy north; east side of Waterloo road between Hollinger avenue and northerly town limits and Mountjoy or (Vimy road) between Hollinger avenue and northern town limits;—240 names.

Sub-division No. 6—North side of Hollinger avenue between Young street north and Waterloo road; Messines avenue, Cambrai avenue, Mons avenue, Borden avenue and Laurier avenue between Rea street north and Waterloo road; First street and Second street between Young street north and Cameron street north; east side of Young street north between Hollinger avenue and northerly town limits; Avenue road Charles street, Cameron street north, Rea street north, McLeod street and the west side of Waterloo road between Hollinger avenue and northerly town limits;—324 names, and 2 on part II.

Polling sub-division No. 7—South side of Hollinger avenue from Cameron street to Mattagami river; Wilson avenue and Main avenue and north side of Commercial avenue between Cameron street and Mattagami river; south side of Commercial avenue from Cameron street to town limit, being two lots west of Young street; Bannerman avenue and the north side of Middleton avenue between Cameron and town limits (two lots west of Young street); west side of Cameron street; Young street between Hollinger avenue and Middleton avenue; Fogg street and Gillies street between Hollinger avenue and Commercial avenue;—180 names, and 3 on part II.

Polling sub-division No. 8—South side of Hollinger avenue, Wilson avenue, Main avenue, Commercial avenue, Bannerman avenue and the north side of Middleton avenue between Cameron street and Preston street; the east side of Cameron street, Rea street, and the west side of Preston street between Middleton avenue and Hollinger avenue;—274 names, and 5 on part II.

Polling sub-division No. 9—South side of Hollinger avenue, Wilson avenue, Main avenue, Commercial avenue, Bannerman avenue, and the north side of Middleton avenue between Preston and Mountjoy streets; the east side of Preston street, Wilcox street and the west side of Mountjoy street between Middleton avenue and Hollinger avenue;—284 names, and 10 on part II.

Polling sub-division No. 10—South side of Middleton avenue, First avenue, Kirby avenue, Way avenue, Wende avenue, Montgomery avenue, Columbus avenue, Branch avenue and Southern avenue between Mountjoy street and the westerly town limits;

Accident on the Highway

If you cannot produce your Motor Vehicle Operator's License when called upon, you are presumed to be an incompetent Driver

Always carry your Motor Vehicle Operator's License when driving a car. Your license is your authority to drive. It is illegal to be in charge of a car without it.

In case of accident or infraction of The Highway Traffic Act, your Motor Vehicle Operator's License will be called for at once by the traffic patrol or policeman. At any time, on the highways or on town or city streets, officers of the law may ask you to produce it. If you are unable to do so, you are subject to a fine.

If you have not yet applied for your Motor Vehicle Operator's License, secure it at once. Application forms can be had at any garage. Anyone who has driven 500 miles, and for 6 months continuously, and who has no physical disability which may interfere with the operation of a car may be granted a License. Examinations will be given to all other applicants.

The Motor Vehicle Operator's Licenses are a measure of protection of yourself and all others on the road. Identification of drivers will lead to the weeding out of the incompetent and reckless.

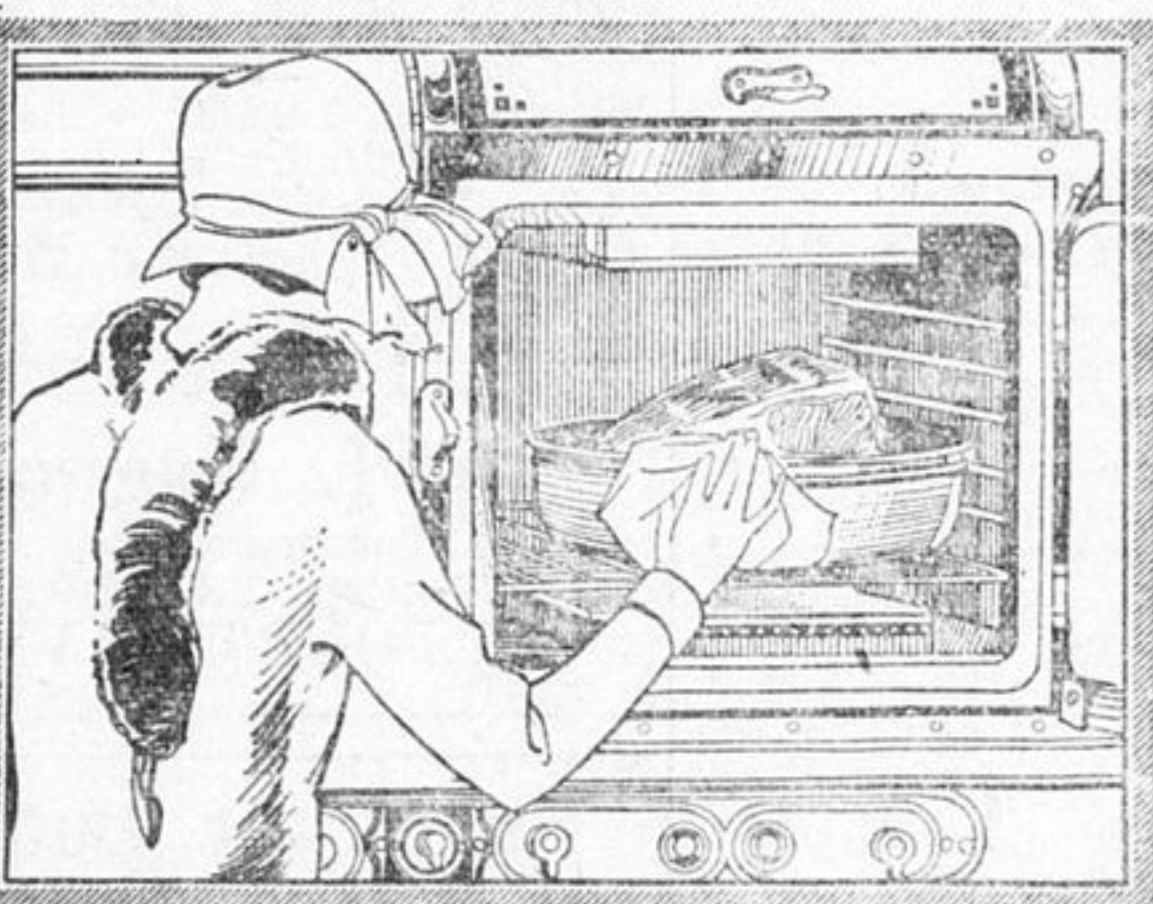

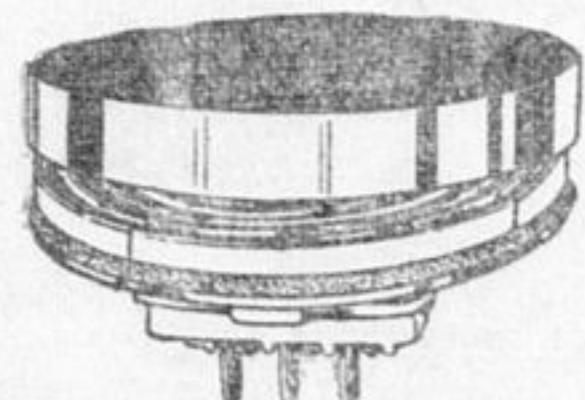

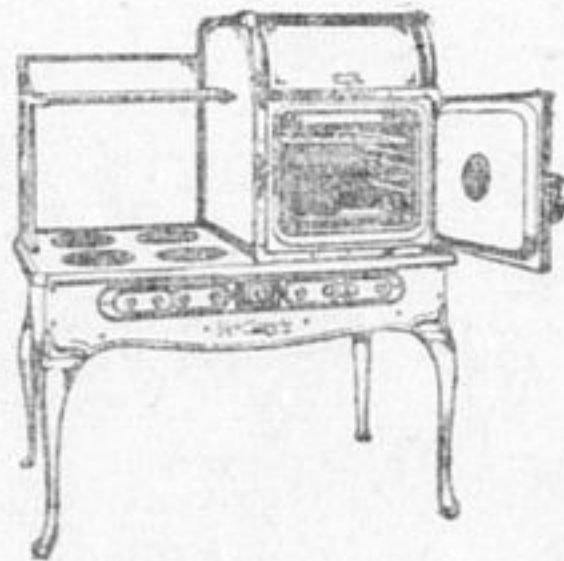
