

GOOD WORK OF CHILDREN'S

Society Deserves the Support of All Right-Thinking People, Says The Haileyburian

With the incident of the care of two children suddenly left fatherless in a strange country where they had lost their mother but a few months ago, The Haileyburian takes occasion to say a few good words for the work of the Children's Aid Society in the North. The Haileyburian says:-

"Two little girls aged eight and twelve years are all that are left of a family which arrived last spring from Finland to settle in Canada. The father, Mick Porre who had secured a job in the Wright-Hargreaves mine at Kirkland Lake, met with an hard-burned brick and has a small airaccident in the mine last week, when he was crushed by a fall of rock and died later in hospital. The mother had succumbed to illness three months ago, shortly after the arrival of the family in this country, where they at Trail, British Columbia. In other more active ways the Government is also taking especial care to do away with the danger of forest fires. At the present time the Government has under consideration a telephone line for the use of the fire rangers who patrol the Temagami Forest Reserve. The line, when completed, will link up all the various observation towers in the area, including the one at Cobalt, with the headquarters of the chief ranger, Mr. Hindson, at Temagami. The system, it is said, has been so arranged and perfected that the location of a reported fire can be determined at once almost within a quarter of a mile. 

Abbe Dudemaine was the pioneer priest of the district, and his review of the history of the area was one of remarkable interest. The first two colonists of the area, he said, came into the country in 1910, coming by canoe from Temiseaminque. It took a month to make the trip. The two pioneer settlers brought their families with them, and they had over two tons of foods and supplies transported to the new area to meet their needs. In 1911 the railway was built through Amos and an office was opened for the sale of town lots at Amos. From that time steady progress has been made.
