Midfield play followed, when some good combination was played by both teams, the McIntyre forwards excelling in this style of game. The first half ended 1 to 0, with the McIntyre again pressing and heading.

Again the McIntyre went onto the attack and Cran missed a splendid goal by inches, the ball just skimming the crossbar with Elrick out.
