Northern Crusade Will Have Many Important Results

All the newspapers of the South were impressed by the Northern Ontario Crusade to Toronto last week, and this was especially true of Toronto journals. Probably none of the Toronto newspapers gave the Crusade the intelligent interest shown by The Globe.

The arrival in Toronto yesterday of the great motored car from New Ontario was an event of unusual importance, which is certain to have far-reaching results for the city, the North Land, and the Province as a whole.

"For the residents of the older portion of the Province yesterday's visit must have had considerable significance, for it cannot have failed to remind them that none of the towns from which the 'Crusaders' travelled were in existence a quarter of a century ago."

"A feeling has sometimes prevailed that the development of Northern Ontario has been too slow. Apart from the mining industry, there has been nothing spectacular about its progress."

"Northern Ontario is no longer the haunt merely of the explorer, the prospector, the lumberman and the Indian. It has become the centre of big business, and many of its towns enjoy the luxuries and comforts found in older communities."

That their mission would promote greater friendship and co-operation between the people of the North Land and Old Ontario, was the opinion expressed by Hon. G. Howard Ferguson. The Premier complimented the women of the North on their efforts towards community welfare and public health. Women did well to give attention to such important factors in national life. He hoped the members of the Crusade would enjoy their holiday in Toronto, and in being given the freedom of the Canadian National Exhibition and of the city.

Mrs. J. E. Patterson expressed the appreciation of the members of the Crusade for the fine hospitality accorded to them in Toronto. Mrs. Carter stated that the new Ferguson highway would open up many advantages

PRODUCTION AT DOME INCREASED FOR AUGUST

Dome's production in August was \$335,436, compared with \$329,901 in July and \$324,243 in August last year, according to a wire received from New York last week by Arthur E. Moysey & Co. Production for the first eight months of this year amounts to \$2,601,238, compared with \$2,634,474.

The increase for the month of August of approximately \$6,000 over last year and the slightly better showing over July of this year is encouraging. It should be remembered in considering these figures that Dome this year is only paying \$1 a share instead of \$2 last year, and consequently meeting a nice surplus on operation.
