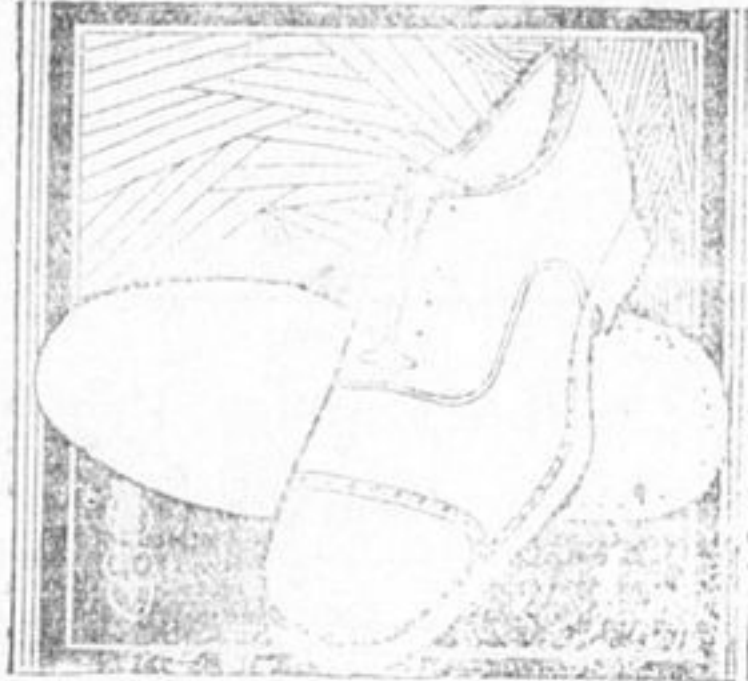

Miss Dell Ferguson is taking a well-earned holiday at her home in Ren-

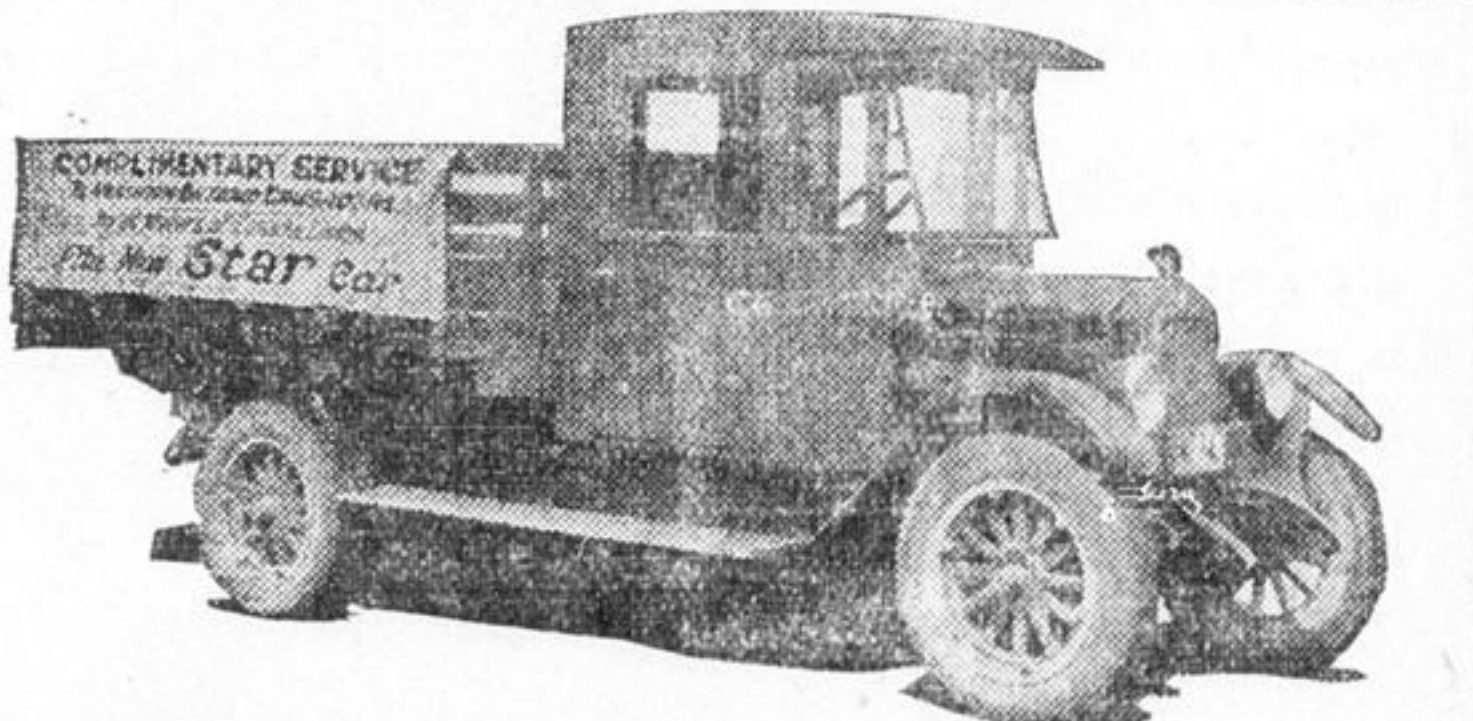
frew. During Miss Marshall's vacation she took the superintendency of the Sunday school.

COMPLIMENTARY SERVICE GIVEN MOTOR CRUSADERS



Durant Motors of Canada, Limited, sent two expert mechanics and truck from Toronto and their report is interesting

An interesting sidelight on the motor trip of the Crusaders from Northern Ontario to Toronto is contained in the report of the mechanics who were sent from Toronto by Durant Motors of Canada, Limited, to accompany the big parade and give any assistance that might be required as a complimentary service.
These two mechanics set out in a New Star Truck, well supplied with equipment to take care of almost any trouble that might arise with any make of car. The fact that more than ten per cent. of the cars were New Star Cars and that not one of these required any attention whatever did not interfere with the good work which the Star Car men were out to do.
"The first call for our service," said one of the mechanics, "was while we were on our way north. We were about 40 miles north of North Bay on a stretch of road that is 80 miles long and is not inhabited. A man driving a small truck was taking supplies to a construction camp and had run out of gasoline. We supplied him with four gallons and a quart of oil and, after watching the performance of our Star Truck, he declared that his next truck would be a Star."
The next call for the service of these men was on the return journey, just north of Cobalt. The owner of a New Star Car was driving with too much air in his tires. The mechanics let the pressure down to the right amount—and the driver went smilingly on his way.
There was some tire trouble that the boys fixed up and then, some three miles

from North Bay, where the road surface is loose sand, making fast driving rather risky, there was a miniature smashup. Two cars collided and one of them slipped sideways into a third. A gas tank was knocked off, from one large car, while on another there was a badly bent fender and hub cap. The third car suffered a broken front bumper and smashed radiator.
"Inside of 25 minutes we had all three cars on their way again," is the modest way in which the mechanics reported the matter.
Four miles north of Powassan they towed an automobile out of the ditch and got it under way, and then north of Trout Creek they discovered a car stalled. Examination showed that the carbureter was not functioning properly, and the driver admitted that he had had it off the day before to clean it. He evidently made a bad job of it, because he neglected to replace all the parts.
"We soon had him fixed up," the mechanics stated, "and as this party drove away they spoke very highly and appreciatively of the complimentary service Durant Motors of Canada, Limited, had provided."
