MCINTYRE AND CORNISH DRAW IN BOXER CUP GAME

Neither Team Able to Score in Brilliant Match Here. Good Refereeing Featured the Game.

One of the best exhibitions of football was witnessed on Saturday afternoon when the Cornish One-and-All and the McIntyre battled it out for one hour and half in a 0-0 draw in the Boxer's Cup final.

A special feature of the game was the fine refereeing of W. Field, secretary of the P.D.F.L. This was without doubt the best exhibition of refereeing this season and the game was of especial interest accordingly.

The teams lined up as follows:—
McIntyre—Parker, goal; Johnson and Goodman, backs; Woods, Taylor and Cran, half-backs; Barron, N. Dougall, Truscott, E. Dougall and McLatchie, forwards.

Cornish—Wills, goal; Street and Hooper, backs; Hignman, Harris and Rice, half-backs; Doddridge, Toms A. N. Other, Chalmers and Wareham, forwards.

The game was very evenly contested and each goal was visited in turn. The McIntyre who had opened with a heavy attack on the Cornish goal seemed to be out to win. This attack was only temporary as the Cornish took matters up very decidedly, but could not get the ball past Parker. The game was very fast and some good combination plays were the order. Both defences deserve the highest praise for their splendid game. Willis, in the sticks for the Cornish, was in brilliant form. On the other hand the penalty kick taken by Hignman was a very clever save on the part of Parker. All through the game the pace was fast and near the close of the game, Street took a free kick for a slight infringement of the rules. The kick was dead on and extremely fast. Parker made a spectacular save and the loud applause showed that the supporters were watching the game closely. Neil Dougall got hurt and had to retire; on coming back upon the field the referee waited for him to play the ball and then retired him for the breach of not notifying the referee of his return. Both teams made very decided efforts to score, but as they were both evenly matched and in the best of form the game had to stand as the above score shows, a draw and to be replayed. The replay is set for Saturday at 4.30 p.m.

SUDBURY LIQUOR STORE KEEPING OPEN EVENINGS.

Commencing this week the Sudbury Government Liquor Store is to remain open five nights a week, being closed on Wednesdays at 1 p.m., to allow the staff a half holiday. The store keeps open on Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m., and on the other week-days, excepting Wednesdays, from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. The innovation was proposed by those in charge of the store, to accommodate the public, especially those from out-of-town, the train service making the night service very desirable. The Liquor Control Board issued special permission for the change in hours asked for by the Sudbury store.
