## HOUSE ON COMMERCIAL AVENUE DAMAGED BY FIRE

Blaze at Midnight in House During Absence of Family. House and Contents Damaged.

There was an alarm of fire at 12.10 Monday night or Tuesday morning from Box 52, the fire being at 69 Commercial avenue, owned by Mrs. A. Dubois. Mr. and Mrs. Dubois have been away and there was no one in the house at night, though a daughter visited the place in the day-time on occasion. The cause of the fire is accordingly a mystery, though it may be possible that it was due to the explosion of a lamp that had been left burning, and forgotten. The fire chief after the fire was extinguished found in the shed, where the fire seemed to have started, pieces of the glass bowl of a lamp. When the fire was first discovered it had a good grip and as the house was a small one-storey structure of light construction it looked probable that the place would be a total loss. However, the motor truck and firemen made one more record run and did speedy and effective work. The fire was soon under control, with the chief damage in the shed and at the rear of the house, the front being unharmed by the blaze. Damage to the house is estimated at three or four hundred dollars and another two or three hundred dollars' loss in the contents of the house. There was \$1000.00 insurance on the house and \$800.00 on the contents, so that the loss is fully covered.
