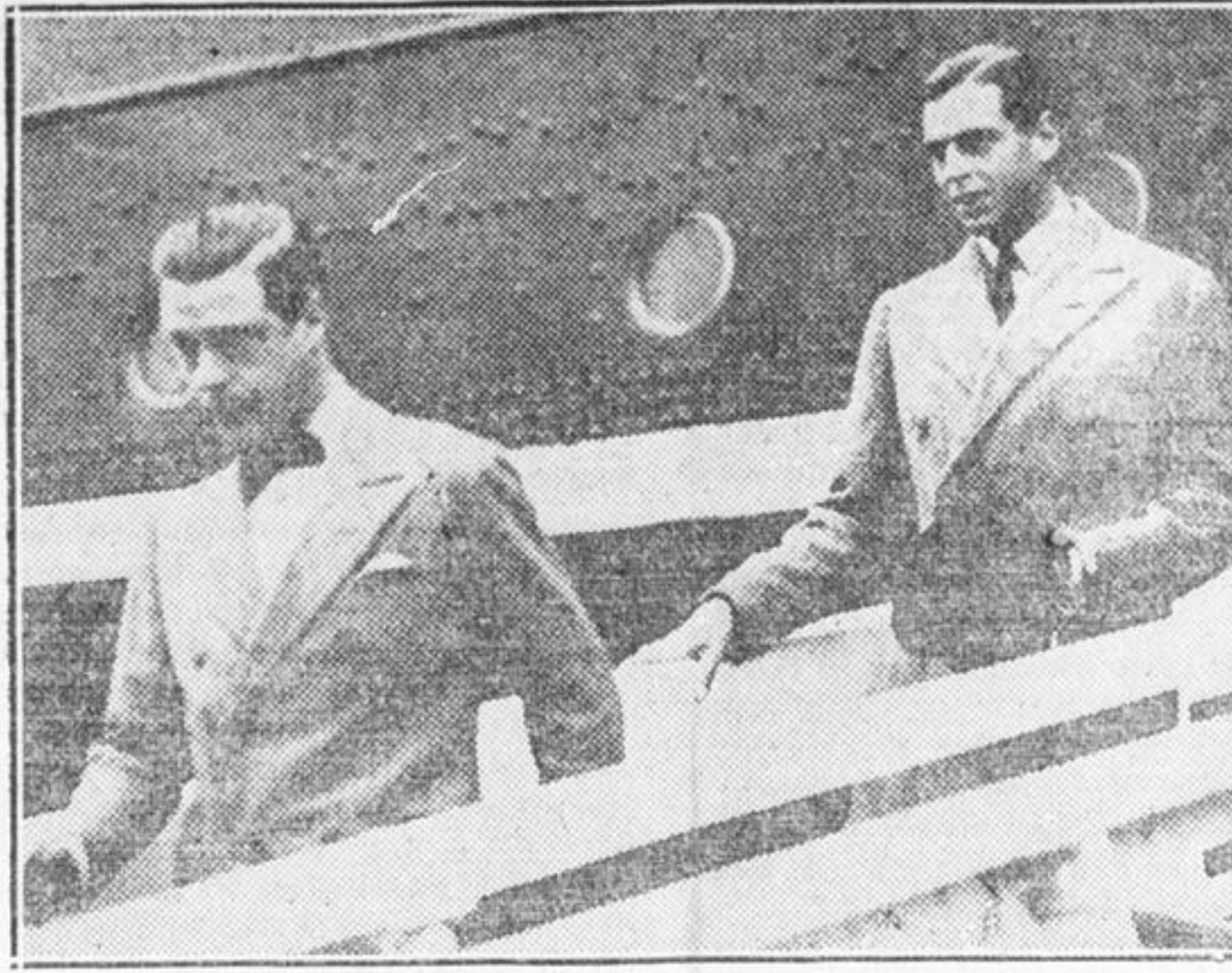
COPPER PROSPECTS TEN YEARS AGO IN DISTRICT

Excellent Results Followed Work on the Grassie River on LeRoi and Berrigan Claims.

In looking over the files of The Advance for the column "Ten Years Ago in Timmins," note was taken of the following article on the front page of The Advance of Oct. 3rd, 1917. The article should have especial interest at the present moment with the attention being given to copper-gold finds and with the notice attracted by the Kamiskotia area these days. The Kamiskotia area is likely to prove that the Porcupine has copper deposits. The article suggests that elsewhere in Porcupine there may be copper deposits worthy of attention. The article in question follows:—"Porcupine is undoubtedly one of the greatest of the world's known gold camps, but certain shrewd prospectors and mining men have maintained that it is also unusually rich in other minerals as well. The work done on the asbestos properties in Deloro seems to sustain this claim so far as asbestos is concerned, while there have also been noteworthy discoveries of other minerals. One of the latest sections of the Porcupine to develop great promise is the Grassie River area where noteworthy finds of copper have been made. There are two claims on which much work has been done—one owned by Mr. LeRoi and the other by Steve Berrigan and partners. On both these claims the showing is most encouraging and veins of special promise have been located. On the LeRoi claim there is a vein followed now for over half a mile. This vein runs from 30 to 35 feet wide along much of the length, the average width being 25 feet. Although the showings of native copper are not numerous the ore is high-grade copper ore, and assays show that it runs as high as 20 per cent. copper. A shaft was sunk on this property at the top of the hill on which the vein is located. This shaft was put down for 15 feet and a tunnel was run from the lower side of the cliff, just above the water's edge at the lake beside which the property is situated. This tunnel has been run in for over 102 feet, drifting with satisfactory results, and a raise has been made to meet the 15-foot shaft. The samples also show good sprinkling of gold, with traces of silver. The formation is granite and porphyry-schist. The LeRoi claim was originally staked by Messrs Stanley Martin and Jos. Moore.

"The vein uncovered on the Berrigan claim is a mile long and 35 to 40 feet wide of apparently high-grade copper ore. The highest assays show 24½ per cent. of copper, and the usual run of samples prove up 18 to 20 per cent. copper. The samples also have been running \$1.00 to \$2.90 per ton in gold. On this property also much work has been done with promising results. Test pits have been sunk and general surface work carried on. One prospector who knows the mining game from end to end places himself on record as of the opinion that these copper properties will eventually develop into notable additions to the Porcupine's mining industries. The properties are about fifteen miles due south of Timmins."
