**TOWN OF TIMMINS**

**NOTICE**

**Proposed By-Law No. 348**

A By-Law for stopping up part of Broadway Avenue and for selling the surface rights thereof.

Take notice, that the Council of the Town of Timmins has considered a By-law stopping up Broadway Avenue from the westerly limit of original Lot 12 (in the block west of Elm Street) to a line drawn across Broadway from the northeast corner of Lot 980, Plan M-9, Temiskaming, to the southeast corner of Lot 740, Plan M-30, Sudbury (in the block east of Pine Street), and providing for the sale of the soil and freehold of the stopped-up portion, subject to the reservation of minerals by original owners, to the respective owners of the lands abutting thereon, according to law.

Before finally passing this By-law the Council will hear any person, or by his counsel, solicitor or agent, any person who claims that his land will be prejudicially affected by the By-law, and who applies to be heard at a special meeting of the Council to be held at the Town Hall, Timmins, on the 17th day of October, 1927, at 4 o'clock.

The proposed By-law provides that the respective owners of lands abutting on the stopped-up portion of the highway shall have the privilege of purchasing the soil and freehold of it, according to a sub-division and plan attached thereto, at prices fixed by the Council, and on the terms of an agreement providing for the payment of the purchase price, one-quarter down and the balance in three equal annual instalments.

The said plan, schedule of prices and form of agreement for sale may be examined at the Clerk's Office in the Town Hall at any time during office hours.

And it is further provided, that if any owner of abutting property does not exercise his right to purchase within thirty days from the final passing of the By-law, the Council may sell the part which he has the right to purchase to any other person at the same or a greater price.

**ROBBERIES EPIDEMIC AT PORQUIS JUNCTION**

A correspondent at Porquis Junction writes:—  
"On Tuesday night of last week, the Northern Development Branch warehouse at Porquis Junction was broken into and a considerable amount of blankets and other goods stolen. Entrance was made by breaking a back window. No trace of the thieves have been found as yet. This brings the number of robberies in the Junction during the past year to four. First F. C. Richardson's store and post office was robbed of about \$400 in cash. A few days later John Rowlandson's store was entered and all the money in the till, amounting to about \$18 was taken. A few weeks ago they again visited Mr. Rowlandson and took about \$100 worth of goods, including a rifle and case. In every case entrance was made by breaking or removing a window. No arrests have been made so far.

**DEATH OF THE LATE JAMES R. BARRY AT BUFFALO, N.Y.**

The late James R. Barry, brother of Mrs. D. B. Durack, formerly of Timmins, occurred last week at Buffalo, N.Y. The funeral took place at Renfrew on Sunday, Oct. 9th, from the residence of Mr. D. J. Ritza to St. Francis Xavier church, Renfrew, where mass was said. Interment was made in the Renfrew R. C. cemetery. The late James R. Barry, who was occupied in railway and highway construction work during the greater part of his life, was engaged in the construction of a power dam in the vicinity of Buffalo when a stone rolling from an embankment struck him on the head while in the act of supervising operations. He passed away without regaining consciousness. He was in his 48th year and was unmarried. He is survived by his mother and five sisters, the mother and an unmarried sister, Miss Jean, residing in Toronto. Mrs. D. B. Durack, of North Bay, is also a sister. The pall-bearers were G. A. Telford, of Lindsay, D. B. Durack, of North Bay, Edward Scott and D. J. Ritza, of Renfrew, brothers-in-law and Lt.-Col. L. T. Martin, of Ottawa and M. J. O'Brien, Jr., of Calabogie, cousins.

**BIBLICAL PROPHET IN THE RED LAKE COUNTRY.**

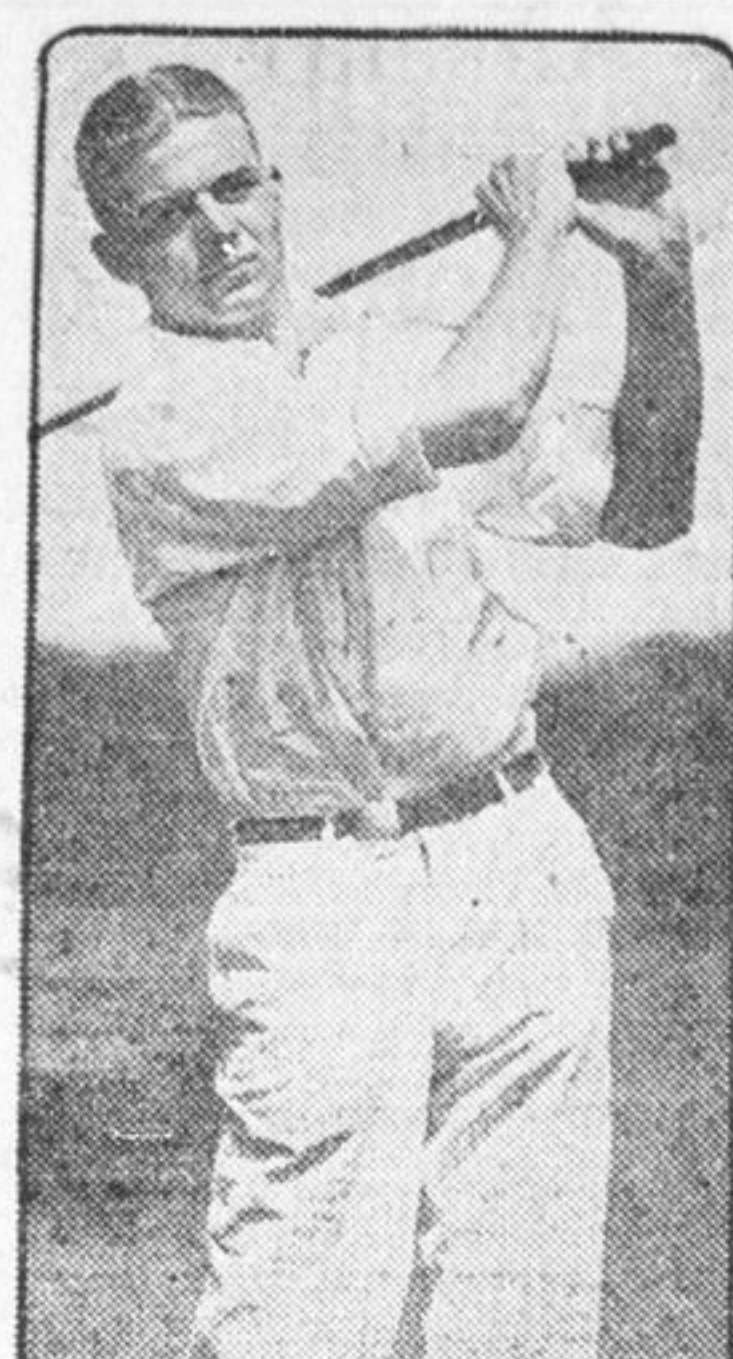
