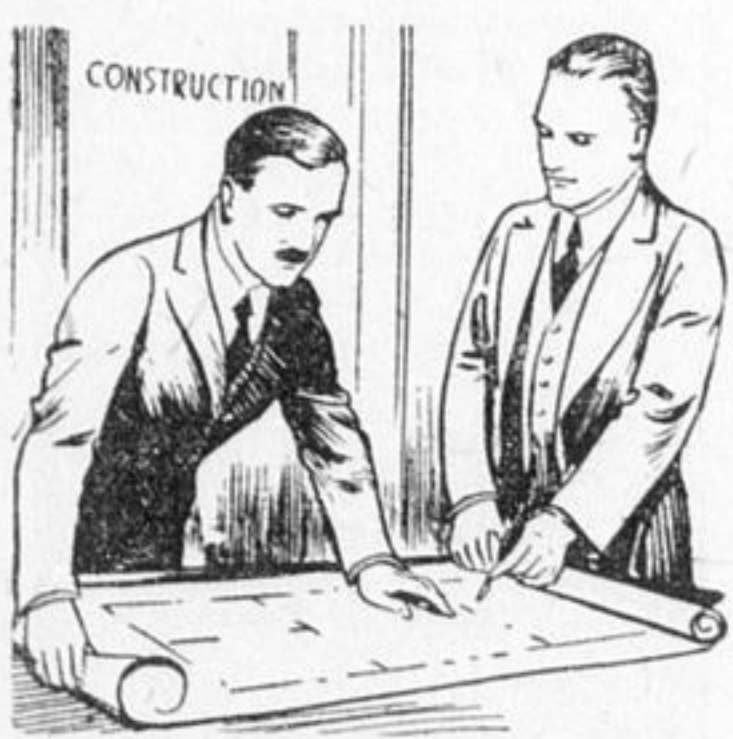

The letter from Mayor Webb is as follows:

President and Members, Canadian Legion, B.E.S.L., Timmins, Ont.

Dear Comrades:—I feel very badly in having fallen down in keeping my appointment with you last Sunday evening. I had fully hoped and expected to be with the Winnipeg party who visited the mining region in "New Ontario," and practically up to ten o'clock Friday night I anticipated going with them, but I was suddenly advised of three very important civic matters coming up in the city this week, which made it absolutely impossible for me to leave. I am sure you will realize that the importance of these matters is the only reason that kept me away.

What I feel more keenly is the fact that I am not certain whether Colonel Baxter advised you in time that I would not be present Sunday night. If this was not done, it naturally makes the situation so much more

serious.
