ONTARIO HAS WOMEN PULPWOOD CONTRACTORS

Women are taking a place in every line of business and profession. In this modern innovation, Ontario is taking a leading place, women showing their capabilities in innumerable ways, though no particular noise is made about the matter. Ontario twenty years ago had a woman constable, regularly appointed. In the North Land towns and mining camps women have conducted business, professions, etc., in many cases being unusually successful. There have been several women prospectors, but it is a fact that none of them have won any outstanding success in this line. One of the latest references to women in business is made in the last issue of The Canadian Lumberman. The Canadian Lumberman says:—

"Mrs. Kate Bowerman, of Dorion, Ont., and her sister, Mrs. McIntyre, of Hurkett, Ont., are the only women pulpwood contractors in Ontario. Mrs. Bowerman says that she expects to take out about 200 cords of pulpwood this year and has a contract with Don Clark. She adds that there will be a lot of wood taken out this winter as several logging camps have been running for two or three months already and operation conditions have been very good. "We have had a lovely fall—the best in years—and if the rest of the winter is as good, we hope to do well this season," concludes Mrs. Bowerman."

MADE CANADIAN RECORD IN BUILDING RAILWAY

In the recent completion by Messrs. Angus M. Taylor, Ltd., North Bay, of the line of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway into the Rouyn mining area, that firm created a new record for railway construction in the Dominion of Canada. The 29 miles of trackage involved was put in place and fully ballasted in six months and one day. When the character of the region through which the line runs is taken into account, with its numerous hills and lakes, it must be conceded that the firm in question has established a mark for other contractors to shoot at, and which is likely to remain for several years to come. WATER TANK DESTROYED BY FIRE AT KIRKLAND LAKE

There is something funny in stating that a water tank was destroyed by fire, but that is just what happened at Kirkland Lake last week. In reference to the incident The Kirkland Lake Northern News says:—

"The Tough-Oakes water tank that has stood for some years was totally destroyed by fire on Tuesday night. The fire was discovered around the bottom of the tank about 10.30 and the Kirkland Lake Fire Brigade summoned. As there was no available water supply they were unable to offer any assistance but stayed around with the crowd that assembled to watch the tank burn. The tank was about two inches thick and stood on a trestle 30 feet from the ground. Until the fire burned through no water could be released, which took about one hour, and by that time the tank was ruined. A large number of people stayed watching the fire until one o'clock expecting to see the tank fall but they were doomed to disappointment, as the ruins stood until Wednesday morning. In conversation with The Northern News, Mr. Stuart, manager of the Tough-Oakes said that the loss of the tank would not affect the operation of the mine as it was only used as a stand-by. The tank was insured for \$2,500."

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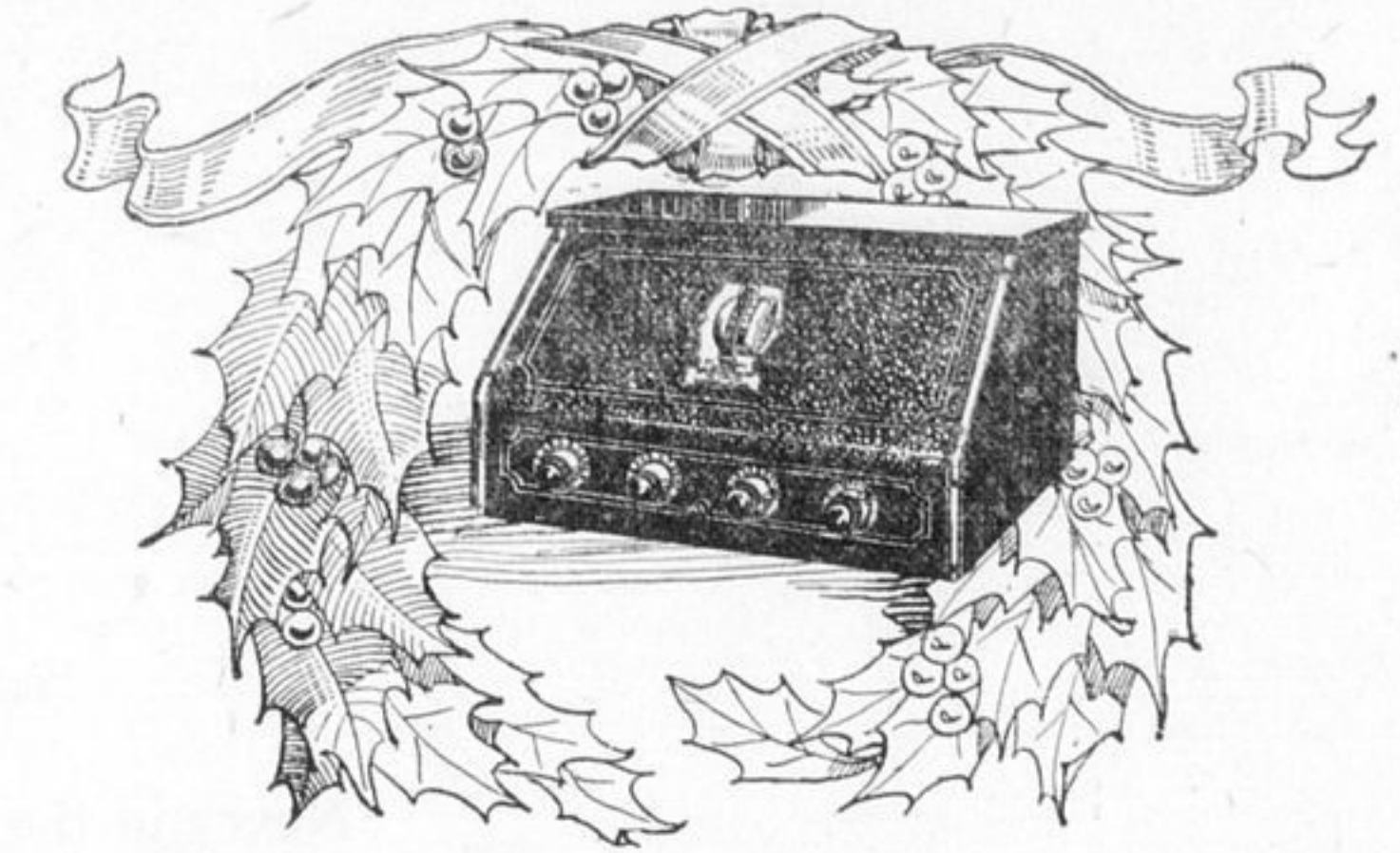
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
