Mayor Longmore Only One to Qualify for Mayoralty. Five Qualify for Council, but Dr. Brennan Resigns Before 9 p.m. on Tuesday Night. New Nomination and Election for Two More Councillors Necessary.

There were twenty nominated for council, but only five qualified, these being: W. H. Pritchard, Geo. S. Drew, A. G. Carson, P. Dougall and qualifying were duly elected by acclamation.
