### CANADIAN PROSPECTOR'S ASSOCIATION FORMED

Port Arthur Man Elected President. Porcupine Camp Represented as Well as Other Camps

On Wednesday evening of last week at a banquet given in the Prince George Hotel, Toronto, by Capt. E. C. Tripp, of Port Arthur to some fifty prospectors, representing every mining camp in Ontario, Quebec and Manitoba, an association was formed to be known as the Canadian Prospectors' and Mining Association.

The organization was formed, following various interviews held between Capt. E. C. Tripp and Lieut. W. J. Carr, organizing secretary of the Christie street hospital branch of the Canadian Legion, who had undertaken certain enquiries on behalf of members of the Christie street hospital branch of the Canadian Legion, who were prospectors in Northern Ontario.

In discussing these matters, Lieut. Carr emphasized the value of organized effort rather than individual, and at request read a paper at the banquet entitled "The Value of Organization." Those present were 100 per cent. for starting the organization.

The objects of the association as adopted are, briefly:

1. To establish a service bureau in Toronto, which will be a central clearing house for prospectors and their business, and a reliable source of information for its members.
2. To provide legal advice for its members and assist them in conducting their business and drafting contracts and agreements.
3. To obtain special rates and concessions from railroads, transportation companies and hotels for its membership.
4. To act as a medium to negotiate between its members and the mining brokers and the interested public.
5. To act as a member's agent and in their interests, and to especially look after their business while away from the city.
6. To enlist the interest of provincial and dominion governments in the problems of the north, and to secure adequate legislation to meet the rapidly changing conditions of the north country.
7. To organize an employment service for its members, and to arrive at a reasonable schedule of rates for contracts and wages for work done on claims and properties.
8. To enlist under a special heading all other classes of men engaged in the mining industries of the north, so that they may benefit by the protection afforded by a strong, organized body.
9. To establish a system of records for each individual member, and assist him to put his affairs on a strictly business-like basis.
10. To collect and issue confidential information to the interested public for a financial consideration.
