WRIGHT-HARGREAVES THE SECOND BEST IN DIVIDENDS

During 1927 the Wright-Hargreaves mine at Kirkland Lake was the second largest dividend-payer among the precious metal mines of Northern Ontario. As one despatch from Kirkland Lake last week put the matter: "Wright-Hargreaves has plucked a long quietly, carrying on development work on a scale in keeping with its size and its plans for further growth. While the grade of ore has been a little lower than some of the other mines, yet among all the gold and silver mines of this province the only company to distribute greater dividends than Wright-Hargreaves was Hollinger Consolidated. Wright-Hargreaves, now able to handle up to 830 tons of ore daily, also stands high in this respect. Also, recent tests showed 1,000 tons hoisted in 24 hours from underground. Lake Shore was the third largest dividend-payer; Dome was fourth, McIntyre-Porcupine fifth, and Teck-Hughes was sixth. Changes in this order will occur in 1928."
