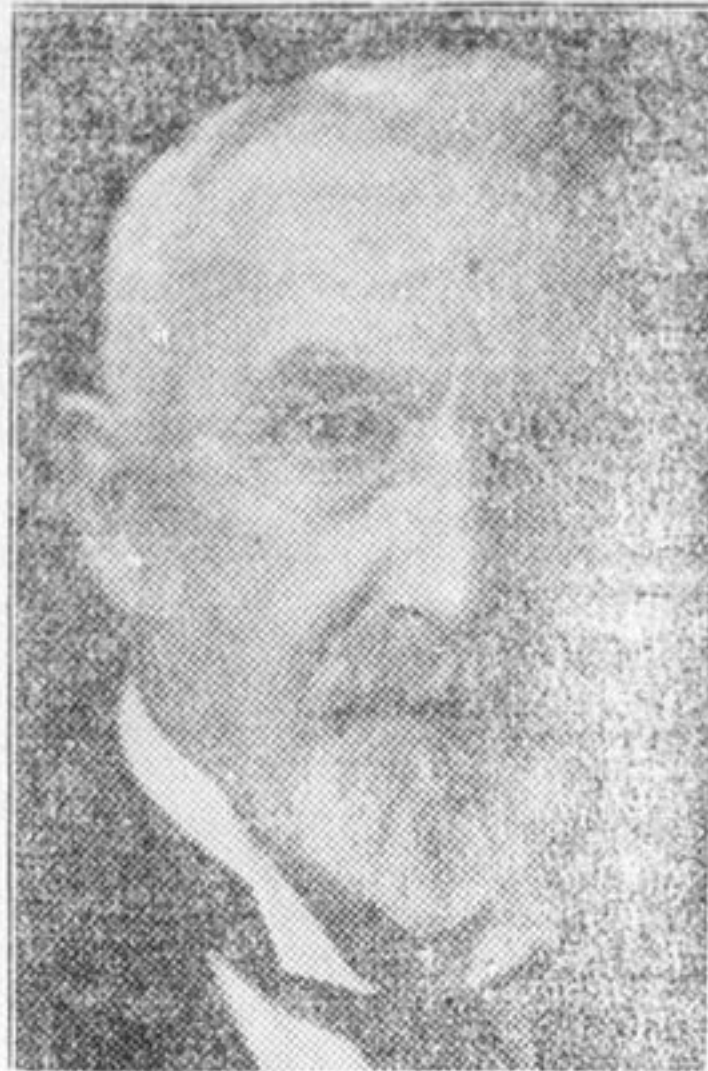

RAILWAY PIONEER HONOURED
George Munro, eighty-three-year-old veteran of Vancouver, who has been awarded a medal by the local Pioneers' Society in recognition of the fact that he is the only living man who saw the first sod turned at Fort William for the construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and was also present when the last spike was driven at Craiglaichie, British Columbia. Mr. Munro punched the first railway ticket of Fort William, and also ticked the first telegraph message from that city. He fitted up the first private railway car in British Columbia when the Marquis of Lorne travelled in that Province.

NEW PAPER NOW BEING ISSUED AT KAPUSKASING

This week The Advance received a copy of The Kapuskasing Courier. It is No. 6 of Volume 1. The new paper is published by the Wright Press, Mr. A. D. Wright, formerly of Timmins, being the editor. The Kapuskasing Courier is a presentable four-page journal with the news of Kapuskasing and district interestingly written. A front page article on the municipal election at Kapuskasing shows that Mr. E. S. Noble received 349 votes in the recent contest for mayor, the two other contestants, Nap. Villeneuve and J. M. Labrosse, receiving 94 and 80 votes respectively. As The Courier remarks, Mr. Noble's majority was an overwhelming one. 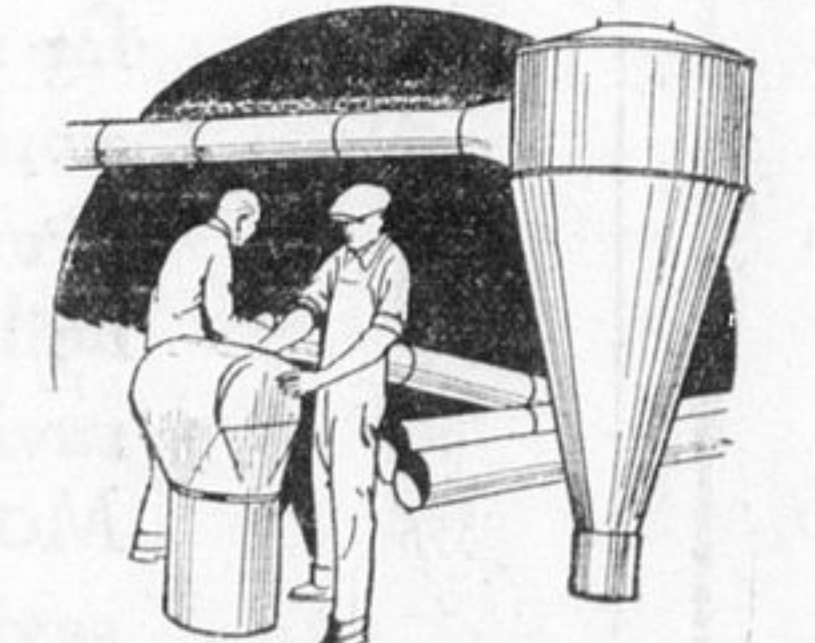

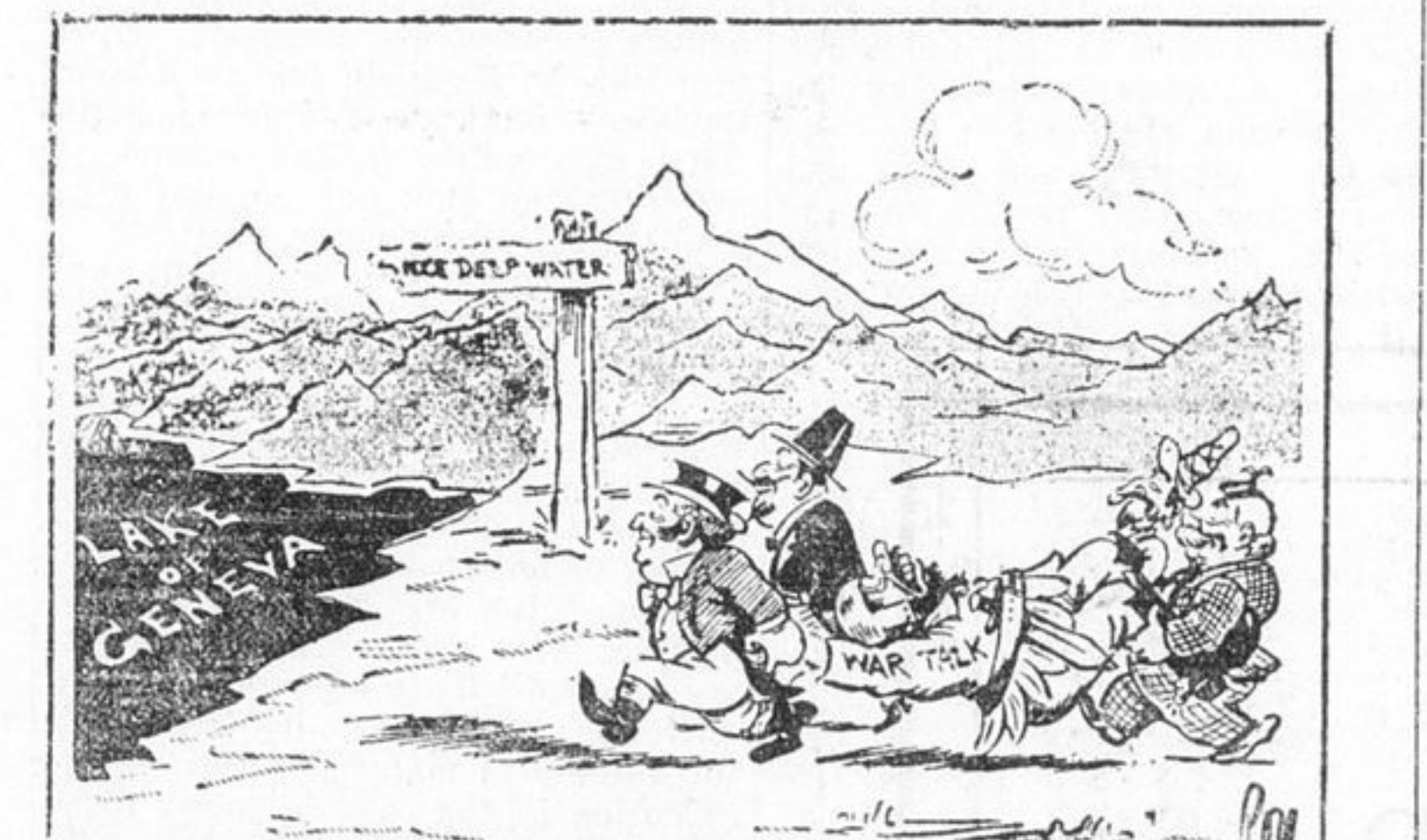
