## Formal Opening of Timmins New Technical High School

Interesting Educational Event, with Inspiring Addresses Exercises of High School Featured by Programme of Outstanding Merit. Mr. D. A. Campbell, Provincial Director of Technical Education, Here for Occasion.

The public opening of the new Technical school, in conjunction with the annual High School Commencement Exercises, held in the new auditorium of the Timmins High School on Friday last, January 27th, 1928, marked an educational epoch in the history of Timmins. Immediately preceding the opening of the programme proper the Timmins High School orchestra rendered several selections in good style; in the meanwhile the commodious new auditorium was being rapidly filled,—indeed, so great was the number that extra seats had to be provided to accommodate the audience, of which a great part consisted of pupils and their parents. Among those present were Mr. D. A. Campbell, director of technical education for the Province of Ontario; Mr. E. L. Longmore, mayor of Timmins; Mr. A. F. Kenning, M.L.A.; Mr. C. R. Murdock, chairman of the Advisory Committee on Vocational Training; Mr. Geo. S. Drew; Mr. A. G. Carson, Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Garner, M.C.; Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Langdon, Mr. Vincent Woodbury, the Rev. Fr. O'Gorman, Mr. McLachlan, chief of police; members of the High School Board and the Advisory Committee; representatives of the Council of the Township of Tisdale; the Principal and Staff of the High School and Technical School; and others.

after inspecting the new building and equipment, that the school board had been well served by their architects, Messrs S. P. Coon, of Toronto, especially with regard to the auditorium, which he regarded as not only a thing of beauty but of utility also. The rest of the building was eminently useful, being designed for the purpose for which it is to be used. He congratulated the contractors, a local firm—Messrs Hill-Clark-Francis, Ltd.—upon bringing to completion such an excellent job. He had also to congratulate the Ontario Provincial Government in that they had not only initiated this scheme but had contributed approximately 75 per cent, of the cost of the building, and would also contribute 33 per cent. to salary costs. The amount, in round numbers, that the Provincial Government had expended on this magnificent building would be \$150,000. He hoped that Mr. D. A. Campbell would convey to the Hon. G. Howard Ferguson the sincere thanks of the Timmins High School Board and the people of Timmins for this building. There was, however, one fly in the ointment, and that was that there had been delay in the delivery of the equipment, as for instance the wood-working machinery. Some delay had also been occasioned by the change of voltage by the power company. However, as these difficulties had been smoothed over, he looked forward to the early date of delivery of the machinery and equipment necessary to complete the training shops.

Mr. C. R. Murdock most ably and efficiently fulfilled the duties of chairman for the occasion, and in his opening address said that he had no doubt that all would agree with him,

so prepared that you can understand it. The laws of success are embodied in every text book, and success is almost invariably the reward of lives of effort. Mr. Longmore concluded his address with a brilliant dissertation on education,—its rewards and effects in after life,—and at the conclusion of a remarkably clear and concise speech was accorded a wonderful ovation.

Mr. C. R. Murdock caused considerable laughter by his explanation of the word "fascinate," and introduced as the next speaker Mr. A. F. Kenning, M.L.A., who was most heartily welcomed by the audience. In thanking the chairman for the invitation to be present that evening, Mr. Kenning congratulated the School Board on their good work in making such a wonderful scheme a possibility, and addressing particularly the pupils, boys and girls, gave some anecdotes of his early days that pointed out clearly the value of education in after school life. Mr. Kenning appealed to every boy and girl to take full advantage of this school and of its increased facilities to fit the pupils for their entry into the world after school days were over for them.

Mr. D. A. Campbell, director of technical education for the province of Ontario, speaking in reference to that part of the programme not connected with speeches, complimented the pupils of the Timmins High School on their linguistic, terpsichorean and musical talent as displayed that evening. It had been a real pleasure to him to be present at this enjoyable function. In an address full of interest to teachers and pupils alike, Mr. Campbell gave instances of the success attending other technical schools in the province, and paid a very decided but well-deserved tribute to Mr. Treleven and his staff for the brilliant results obtained in the past, and confidently predicted success for the future of the new school. Mr. Campbell's learned address was listened to with evident interest by the large audience, the principal points made being heartily endorsed in the usual manner at the conclusion of the appropriate and well-delivered address.

The presentation of prizes and diplomas by Mr. Sullivan followed, and Mr. Treleven, in a few well-chosen words explained the object of the new department of the school, and the arrangements tentatively made with regard to the disposition of the teachers and instructors.

The audience were then invited to inspect the class rooms and to see the equipment of the new school, an invitation that was accepted by the majority present. It was the consensus of opinion by all present that in the High School, its head and staff, Timmins indeed may be counted extremely fortunate educationally.

The handling of the perhaps, unexpectedly large audience, the intelligent drafting and carrying out of the programme reflect the greatest credit on the part of the staff of the school, and emphatically endorses the opinion generally held in Timmins and the immediate vicinity, that in the Timmins High School and its competent head and staff we shall possess a school that will in the near future become an outstanding success, not only in the north land, but in all Canada.
