There will be three thorough investigations into the disaster at the Hollinger. The coroner's inquest with the jury empanelled this week will deal with the facts as elicited by that enquiry.

Impressive Funeral of Group of Finnish Men on Wednesday

Graves Dug at Cemetery and Pathway Strewn with Evergreens. Thousands March Behind Nine Caskets Borne to Last Rest. Band in Attendance Adds to Solemnity of Event.

The funerals of eight Finnish and one Ukrainian were conducted in impressive way on Wednesday afternoon. Services were conducted at the Finnish hall for the eight of that nationality and at the Ukrainian hall for P. Klimko, Ukrainian.

Finnish victims of the disaster were all old residents of the camp and all who knew them deeply regretted their deaths. Those buried included:—Mano Yalo, married; leaves widow; has been three or four years in camp.
