#### THE DISASTER AT THE HOLLINGER WILL BE THOROUGHLY INVESTIGATED

There will be three thorough investigations into the disaster at the Hollinger. The coroner's inquest with the jury empanelled this week will deal with the facts as elicited by that enquiry. The Hollinger Mine is conducting a thorough investigation to assure that never again will such a tragedy occur if it be possible to guard against it. The Government of the province is also to conduct a thorough open investigation, His Honour Judge Godson, a most competent and courageous official, to preside at this court of enquiry .. With these three investigations in progress it seems to be unfair and worse than useless to prejudice the case or form premature conclusions. If no confidence may be placed in any of these enquiries, then it would seem that confidence can be placed in nothing, and so no more need be said. Those who do not know facts that will assist the enquiries would do well to cut surmises and theories. Those who have information to give should tender it to the right authorities in the courts of enquiry, not on the street corner. The great aim should be to prevent the chance of any recurrence of similar tragedy here or elsewhere, and all should work to this end. The mine, the Government, and the people alike desire a full investigation, and all should assist fairly and frankly and reasonably to make the investigation as helpful and advantageous as possible.

#### SINCERE SYMPATHY EXTENDED TO ALL IN LAST WEEK'S TRAGEDY.

To the bereaved families and friends of those who lost their lives in the disaster at the Hollinger on Friday last the deepest sympathy goes out from every heart. The disaster comes with double force because it was so unexpected as to be almost unbelievable. The extent of the tragedy is appalling, because of the comparative freedom of this camp from fatal accidents. The whole camp mourns with those who have lost loved ones in this disaster.

It will take some time for the camp to recover from the shock of the death of thirty-nine good men. But there is some comfort in the wonderful kindness shown on so many hands. From outside there came prompt messages and offers of help. None of the many calls for aid failed to find most generous response. Toronto, Montreal, Ottawa, the railways, towns and cities and individuals far and near, the United States Government,-were more than generous in their interest and efforts. They implemented sympathy by deeds. The mine officials, from the president and the general manager down, showed the keenest devotion to the work of rescue and the relief of the anxious and the distressed. Money was not considered. "How can help be given' was the only motto. The effort and courage of officials and staff was equalled by the generous helpfulness and the sympathy shown by all. There was a readiness to help and a willingness to comfort that offset the few who saw only in the tragedy an opportunity for some advantage. Police and other town officials were tireless in their efforts to make the situation as easy to bear as possible. Human nature was shown at its best in general.

The Finnish men had organized and cleared a single; on the list of dead under the path through the deep snow from the name of Altonen; an old-timer of the cemetery gates to the grave plots. The graves were dug in the form of a long deep trench sloping from the ground so that the caskets could be carried down to their last resting place. The way from the gates to the graves was strewn with evergreens, beauty thus being given to the solemn scene. At least two thousand people followed the bodies in procession to the grave. The Finnish band followed the three sleighs carrying the nine coffins, playing funeral marches. The Finnish and Ukrainian people wore the badges of their societies. The caskets were draped with flowers. There were hundreds of other citizens who joined the Finnish and Ukrainian men, women and children in paying the last sad respects to the dead. The
