TIMMINS BOARD OF TRADE ANNUAL MEETING TO NIGHT

To be Held in the Council Chamber This (Thursday) Evening for Election of Officers, Etc.

The annual general meeting of the Timmins Board of Trade will be held in the council chambers, Fourth avenue, Timmins, on Thursday (this evening), Feb. 23rd, at 8 p.m. The notices sent to members by the untiring secretary, W. O. Langdon, say:—"At this meeting the election of officers will take place. You are earnestly requested to attend as there are a number of other important matters for discussion."

During the past year the Timmins Board of Trade has done the usual amount of good work. The work of the secretary has been particularly helpful and effective. Mr. Langdon has spent unlimited time and effort in answering enquiries, giving information, and otherwise advancing the interests of the town so far as the outside public is concerned. While the lack of general interest and support for the work has been apparent at times during the year, Mr. Langdon has refused to be discouraged. He has apparently taken the attitude that he was doing his part if he did everything possible and did more than should be reasonably expected. The secretary certainly has done his part well. If for no other reason, there should be a large attendance to-night to express appreciation for the untiring and helpful work of the secretary. Of course, there are other strong reasons for interest and effort in Board of Trade work, the advantage and progress of the town being furthered by the efforts of the Board of Trade.

All good citizens should be at the annual meeting of the Timmins Board of Trade this (Thursday) evening, in the council chamber, town hall, at 8 o'clock.

Fancy skating, speed skating, and a number of novelties and specialties of unusually interesting kind will feature the programme at the Kiwanis carnival on Tuesday evening, March 6th.

St John Ambulance Brigade Skating Carnival, Feb. 29th

Races for Boys and Girls and Adults. Championship Events. Exhibition Skating. Fancy Dress Parade. Broom-ball Match. Numerous Other Events at Rink Next Wednesday Evening.

A grand skating carnival is announced to be held in the Timmins skating rink on Wednesday of next week, Feb. 29th, commencing at 8 p.m., under the auspices of the St. John Ambulance Brigade. There are two reasons why there should be a crowded house for the event. The first reason, of course, is that the event will be such a well-worth-while one. The St. John Ambulance Brigade do everything well that they undertake and more than live up to promises made. They promise a big night on Wednesday night next, and they will more than make good.

The other reason is that anything under the auspices of the St. John Ambulance Brigade deserves the heartiest support from the people of Timmins and district. Last week reference was made in these columns to the excellent work done by the S.J. A.C. at the time of the disaster at the Hollinger. Their part in the rescue work was deserving of special note. At the same time it should not be forgotten that every day they deserve credit for the good work being done. On every occasion, whether the people are at work or at play, the St. John Ambulance Brigade members are on hand with their good services. Their first aid at football, hockey and other games has been of much service and advantage. They deserve the fullest support.

It is not necessary, however, to emphasize this feature, in view of the splendid programme announced. This programme, should attract all. It includes:—skating races for boys and girls under 12 years of age; walking races for men only, entrants to wear moccasins; boys' race, over 12 and

under 15 years; girls' race, over 12 and under 15; exhibition fancy skating by Dr. E. O. Sundberg; trap skating for those in fancy costume only; races for boys and girls, over 15 and under 18; Porcupine District Championship Race, 880 yards, open, entrants to give their names for this race only to Manager Cadman at the rink not later than Feb. 28th; ladies' open race; gentlemen's open race; broomball game between two noted teams; fancy dress parade; and numerous other events.

The prizes are many and valuable, and all arrangements have been made to assure a successful and unusually attractive event.

GOVERNMENT TO GIVE FREE TREES FOR PLANTING

Word from the Department of Lands and Forests at Toronto this week is to the effect that the Ontario Government, through the Forestry Branch, has for distribution this year ten million forest trees. These are to be used for reforesting waste areas of the Province, and it is expected that at least three-quarters of them will be used by private individuals throughout Ontario for reforesting waste areas of the farm and for the planting of windbreaks. The Government scheme at present provides that any resident of the Province may secure 3,500 trees free for reforesting work and an additional 500 of spruce and cedar for windbreak planting.

Application for trees should be made to the Ontario Forestry Branch, Parliament Buildings, Toronto.

BARBER SHOPS TO BE OPEN PAY NIGHTS & SATURDAYS

Change Made in By-law Regulating Closing Hours of Barber Shops in Town

As will be noted by the official notice elsewhere in this issue, following the request of the master barbers of Timmins, the by-law in regard to the closing hours of barber shops has been amended to meet the conditions overlooked at the time the by-law was drafted. At the last meeting of the town council By-law No. 64 was duly passed. This new by-law provides that:—

Master barbers be allowed to keep their shops open until 10 p.m. on pay nights and Saturday.

That master barbers be allowed to keep their shops open on Wednesday all day when a general all-day holiday falls in the same week.

That master barbers be allowed to keep their shops open three nights preceding Christmas until 10 p.m.

These amendments, while asked for by the barbers themselves, are in the direct interests and for the special convenience of the public, and customers generally will appreciate them.
