WOMEN'S WORLD'S DAY OF PRAYER HELD AT TIMMINS

Interesting and Inspiring Event at United Church on Friday Last

The annual Women's World Day of Prayer was held at Timmins on Friday last in the United Church. Many from the various protestant churches in the town joined in this special prayer service.

Mrs. McFadden, president of the Baptist Missionary Society of Timmins, presided as chairman for the event, carrying through the duties of the occasion with skill and effect.

In addition to silent prayer and prayer in unison, there were individual prayers, the churches being represented in these prayers as follows: Baptist church, Mrs. John Skelly; Mrs. McFadden, Mrs. Higginbotham; Salvation Army, Mrs. Bond and Lieut. Downs; United Church, Miss Quick, Mrs. Ian Gordon, Mrs. Traver, Mrs. G. A. Macdonald.

Mrs. Wightman, of the United Church, sang "The Perfect Prayer," and Mrs. P. Young, of the Anglican Church, sang "God Wipes the Tears from Every Eye," these two well-presented vocal solos adding much to the interest and inspiration of the meeting.

Mrs. Monk, president of the United Church Missionary Society, read the scripture lesson, the 103rd Psalm.

Lieut. Downs, of the Salvation Army, spoke on "Prayer" in most effective way.

In addition the gathering sang a number of appropriate hymns.

One of the chief items of business before the Kiwanis Club luncheon on Monday at noon in the Empire Hotel was the consideration of the big Carnival to be held in the Timmins Rink on Monday evening, March 5th, under the auspices of the club. The proceeds from this event will all go to the fund of the club for the underprivileged child. It may be noted in this connection that the Kiwanis Club has at the present time one child taking special hospital treatment at Toronto with the chances excellent for the youngster to develop into a strong and healthy child, instead of a cripple, as the child would otherwise be. This youngster has now been in hospital at Toronto for several months, and will spend several more months there. All the expenses in this case are being taken care of by the Kiwanis Club. This is just one sample of the noble work being done by the Kiwanis Club through their fund for the underprivileged child. There are many other cases where the Kiwanis Club has done fine work through this branch of their community service. Accordingly, it should be enough for all to know that the proceeds of the carnival are for the underprivileged child fund to assure a big attendance.

The Kiwanis Club, however, has not been content to let it go at that. Instead, a wonderful programme has been prepared for Monday evening, March 5th, at the Timmins rink, a programme that, of itself and altogether irrespective of the purpose for which the funds will be used, will be well worth far more than the nominal price of admission. The programme will be along the lines of the one given last year, and all will remember how interesting that was, and how all were pleased with it.

One of the outstanding features of the Carnival this year will be the exhibition by Miss Leah Muller, international fancy-skating professional. All will find this exhibition of fancy skating one of the most interesting items on the programme.

Then there will be a big broom-ball game (not on skates), ice races and specialties and novelties of various kinds. Another matter before the Kiwanis Club on Monday was the matter of the quarterly meeting of the Northern Ontario Associated Boards of Trade to be held at Timmins on Thursday, March 8th. The Timmins Board of Trade asked the co-operation of the Kiwanis Club in entertaining the delegates to this meeting and this co-operation was gladly given by the Kiwanis. Delegates from the south to the Northern Ontario Associated Boards of Trade meeting here will arrive here on Wednesday night, March 7th, and curling has been arranged that night for any who care for that sport. On Thursday, March 8th, the regular sessions of the association will be held for the discussion of the various items of business and for discussion of subjects of interest to the North. In the evening of March 8th, the Timmins Board of Trade and the Kiwanis Club are joining forces to suitably entertain the visitors at dinner at the Empire hotel, main dining room. The visitors may be assured of a pleasing evening under the combined auspices of the Board of Trade and the Kiwanis.

The Timmins Kiwanis Club continues to grow in membership, as well as influence and usefulness. Two new members were taken in at Monday's meeting, Messrs Gordon Eplett and A. Sauve, of town.
