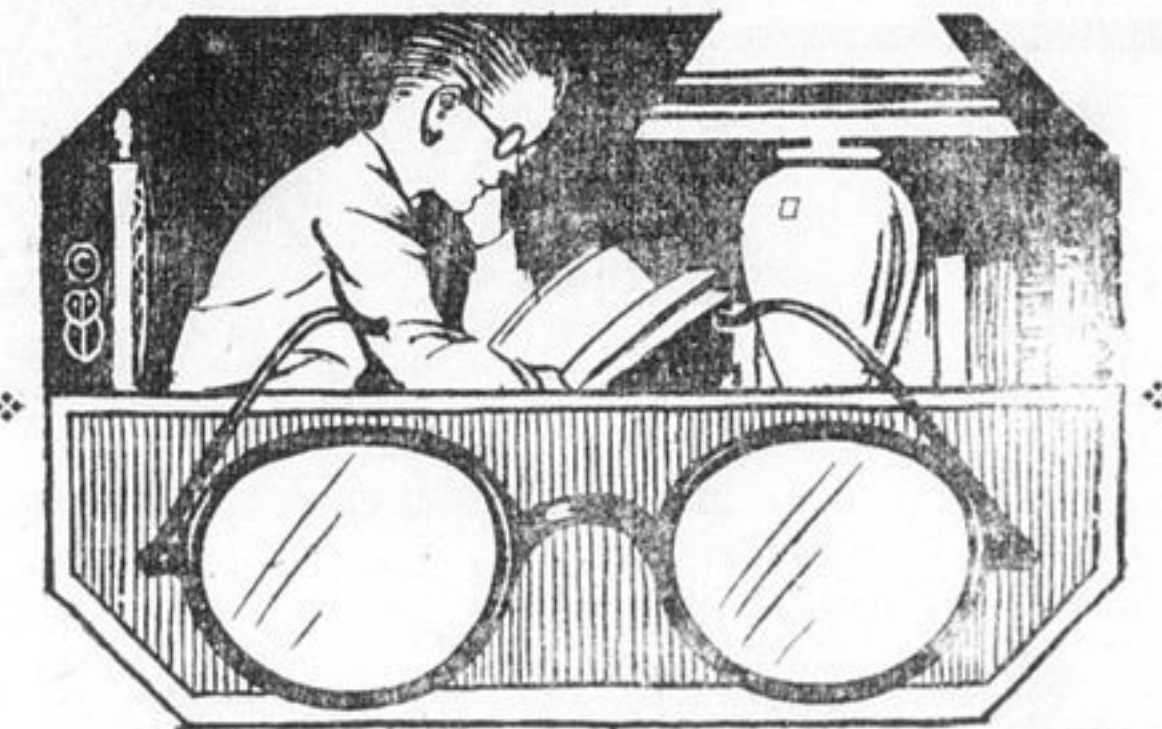
Two drunks each paid \$10.00 and costs.
