If the defence men had passed to the blue line more instead of going up themselves there would have been a far better chance of beating the Soo. When Huggins passed to Wilson for a beautiful score, it looked as if they were going to combine from then on, but they did not; it was individual rushes all of the time. Of course the Soo were no better, but they played an extremely good defensive game, nothing but combination play could get through. All they had to do was to hold their 3 goal lead, and they did it.
