South Porcupine Has Fine Big Programme of Boys' Work

Some Classy Hockey Games at South Porcupine Recently. Results of the Curling Matches. Other Items of Interest from Correspondent at South Porcupine.

South Porcupine, Ont., March 14th, 1928. Special to The Advance.

A very interesting programme of Boys' Work is now being carried out in South Porcupine, embracing boys from 9 to 17. The younger boys, from 9 to 12, have formed themselves into an Explorers' Group and are banded together for weekly explorations into the land of helpfulness. They meet for business on Mondays at 7.00 p.m.; each boy being responsible to supply a place for meeting in his turn. Later on in the week they meet with their leader to do a good turn in the community. The older boys (of the Trail Rangers and Tuxis Groups) have their meeting in the High School on Thursday evenings. This meeting comprises physical culture, handicraft, photography, first aid, and radio. After a short session of physical training the boys go into separate groups for specialized work in one of the above subjects. By this method they learn many useful and practical things. Incidentally they are also, building character. The following are the group leaders: Physical culture, W. Sharp; handicraft, A. Suttie; photography, W. Mandley; first aid, Messrs R. McWilliams, E. Uren and H. Costain; radio, G. Rowe. The work is supervised by Rev. F. J. Baine. The keen interest of the parents, in this useful work, is earnestly solicited.

The young people of the United Church, South Porcupine, held a very successful snow-shoe and ski hike across the lake to Golden City on Thursday evening, March 7th. They were met there by a group of young people from Golden City and were entertained in the public school. A very interesting programme of singing and games was followed by refreshments. The young people pronounce the event a decided success. At the close of each Sunday evening service in the United Church a musical programme is conducted by the choir. This programme consists of sacred instrumental and vocal music, interspersed by congregational singing. All who wish to attend are heartily welcome.

On Thursday evening, March 8th, a lively game of hockey, between the Ankerite and Dome Lake Mines, was witnessed by a small group of enthusiastic spectators. Dome Lake had the best of the play throughout but the Ankerite team was by no means outclassed. The score was 6-2 in favour of Dome Lake, Ray Sampson, Jerry Banning and D. 
