MATTAGAMI RIVER BOOMING COMPANY LIMITED

Whose office is at the Town of Timmins, in the District of Cochrane, hereby gives notice that it has, under Section 7, of the said Act, deposited with the Minister of Public Works at Ottawa and in the office of Land Titles for the District of Cochrane at Cochrane a description of the site and plans of storage and glance booms and other works proposed to be erected in the Mattagami River for the purpose of assisting the driving and storage of logs and timber and avoiding interference of navigation, on the following lands:

PARCEL No. 1—The North-easterly half of the Mattagami River bed extending and lying between the west limit of Lot Eight (8) Concession Five (5), township of Mountjoy, and the southerly boundary of the north-west part of the south part of Lot Two (2) Concession Three (3) extended across the said River.

PARCEL No. 2—The North-westerly half of the Mattagami River bed from the point where the boundary between Lots Three (3) and Four (4) in Concession Two (2) of Mountjoy produced across the Mattagami River upstream to the southerly boundary of the township of Mountjoy.

PARCEL No. 3—The Westerly half of the bed of the Mattagami River from the southerly boundary of the township of Mountjoy upstream through the townships of Ogden, Price and Thorneloe to the northerly limit of that part of the River bed granted for water power purposes, under Crown Lease No. 1830.

PARCEL No. 4—The Easterly half of the Mattagami River bed from the southerly boundary of the lands included in Crown Lease No. 1830 upstream to the southerly limit of the township of Thorneloe.

And take Notice that after the expiration of one month from the date of the first publication of this Notice, Mattagami River Booming Company Limited will, under Section 7 of the said Act, apply to the Minister of Public Works at his office in the City of Ottawa for approval of the said site and plans, and for leave to construct the said works.

PORCUPINE BASIN MINES HAS BEEN INCORPORATED

According to a despatch from Toronto last week, an announcement of interest was that of the incorporation of a new mining company by the name of Porcupine Basin Mines, Limited. Two hundred acres of mining lands situated in the centre of Whitney Township in the Porcupine mining division, have been acquired and will be exploited by the new mining company. PROSPECTORS' CLASSES START HERE NEXT WEEK

Will Continue for Eight Days. Morning Classes in I.O.O.F. Hall. Lectures in Central School

The classes for prospectors, held in this and other districts for years with success, are to start at Timmins on Thursday next, April 5th, and will be carried on for eight days. The classes have always been of service and value and this year will no doubt be of equal interest and usefulness. For years these classes were under the direction of Dr. W. L. Goodwin, who proved himself an ideal instructor and adviser. It is believed that Dr. E. M. Burwash, who will conduct the classes this year, will be equally successful. Dr. Burwash was formerly lecturer in geology at the University of British Columbia and he has a wide reputation as an expert in geology with a wide knowledge and experience. Prospectors and mining men who wish to brush up on their knowledge of prospecting, geology and mining matters generally will find these classes of much advantage and benefit.

The classes for prospectors open in the I.O.O.F. hall on Thursday, April 5th, at 10 a.m. The course will cover the practical study of minerals and practice in mineral spotting and rocks, also instruction in elementary geology and chemistry.

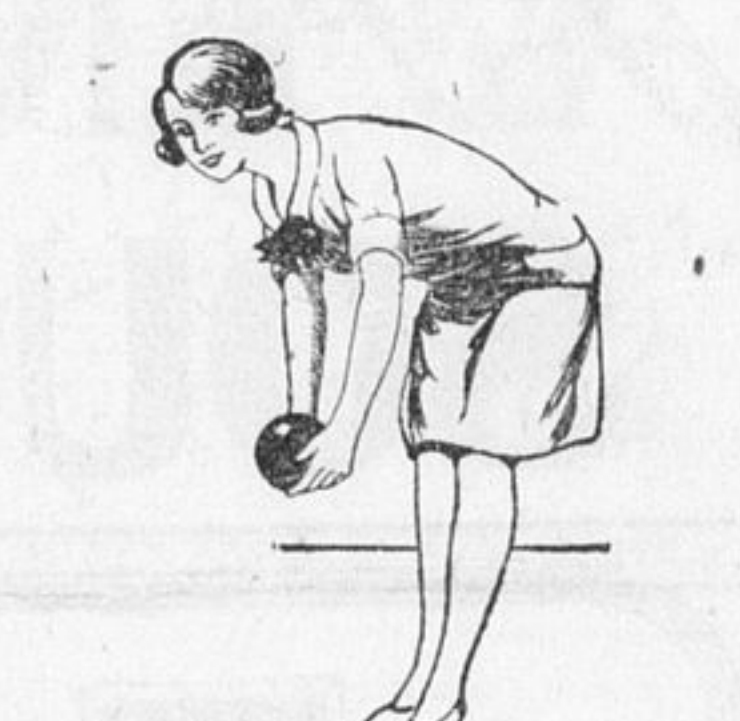
