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MOOSE INVADERS ROUYN BUT IS KILLED ON STREET

Man Responsible for Death of Big Bull Moose Very Promptly Arrested and Fined.

Rouyn had an unusual experience last week when a big bull moose paraded through the town. The animal was followed out of town, however, and shot. Then comes the sequel. With striking promptness a man was arrested and fined \$50.00 for the shooting of the moose. The story is told by The Rouyn News as follows: The inhabitants of Rouyn, were given an unusual thrill last Wednesday, when at about noon, a full-grown bull moose traversed the full length of Perreault street.

He entered the town from an easterly direction, and was in the centre of town before his presence was noted.

As the hue and cry went up and crowds began to gather, he steadily kept on his way, not in the least beligerent, but rather surprised at the racket which the townspeople made. His one desire seemed to be to put as much distance as possible between himself and the noise-makers, and breaking into a shambling, loose-jointed run, which is the peculiar characteristic of his kind, he suddenly decided to leave town by the shortest possible route.

As he coursed down Perreault street, he bore to the left, and came to a halt in a clump of birches near the hospital. He appeared to be in a fatigued condition either from a long trip through the soft snow, or the sudden excitement, or both, and for a few minutes stood comparatively quiet while a large crowd gathered to view the unusual visitor.

After resting, he struck out onto the lake, and as he did so, was partially surrounded, mostly by youngsters. Owing to his excitement, he tried to break through the cordon that was being formed around him, and he did, even though he leaped over a youngster who lay in his path, having slipped and fallen when he saw the moose start toward him. From there he struck westward up the lake, followed closely by a dog or two, and at a more respectful distance by a large majority of the citizens of Rouyn.

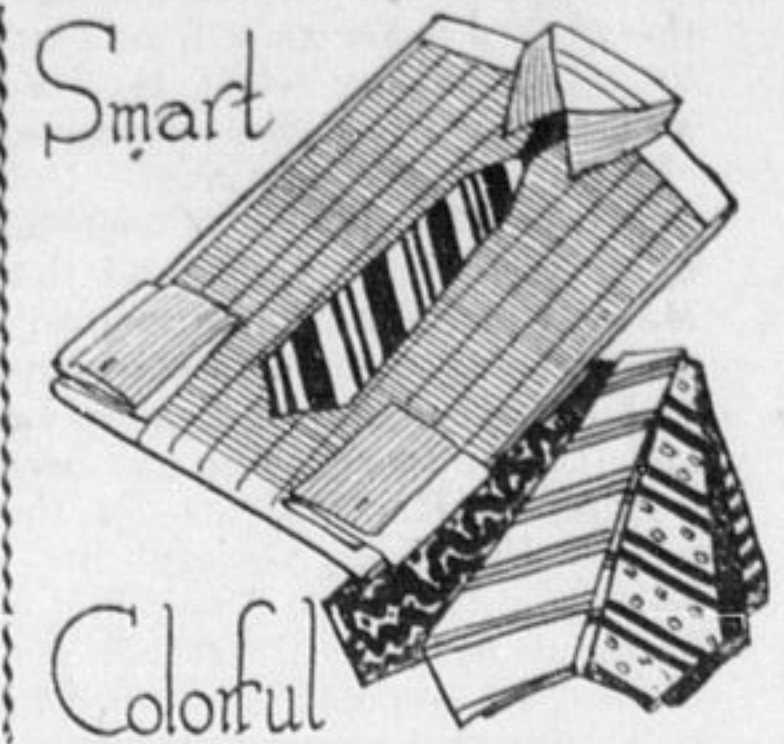
He came upon him in the bush, and by some means succeeded in driving the moose back onto the lake. Then when he had him in plain view and standing still, he shot him.
