## Province to Compensate Sufferers From Silicosis

**Sufferers With Five Years' Service in Mines of Ontario to Be Entitled to Payment. Miners to Be Examined Periodically. Ontario Leads the Way in Adopting Silicosis as a Compensatable Disease.**

In the Ontario Legislature last week Hon. Mr. Price, the Attorney-General announced that Ontario will adopt silicosis as a compensatable disease under the Workmen's Compensation Act. Any one suffering from silicosis in any one of the three stages—anti-primary, primary, or secondary—will be entitled to payment from the Workmen's Compensation Board, provided that the sufferer has served at least a total of not less than five years in the mines of the province.

In the presentation of the matter before the Legislature, it developed that Ontario is the first province or state on the North American continent to place silicosis among the compensatable diseases. The Attorney-General pointed out that the government "has had to feel its way in a pioneer development." The government brought from South Africa, Dr. J. M. Smith, one of the world's outstanding experts on the disease, who spent several months in a study of conditions in Ontario, afterward reporting to the department of mines. His findings were in effect, that conditions were not as bad as had been feared, and he recommended that all workmen should be examined, and a system of examination maintained, and that administration by the Workmen's Compensation Board, having regard to Canadian conditions, would be the best way of handling the situation.

To carry out Dr. Smith's recommendations, and for the protection of the workmen themselves, the law has now been amended to provide for the periodic examination of all men before they are allowed to work underground, and also of the men working underground, and for the giving of certificates to workmen stating their health condition as to freedom from silicosis or tuberculosis, and for the forbidding mining companies to employ any workmen found to have tuberculosis.

The act does not prevent a mine from employing a workman with silicosis, either when he applies for work or—having been in their employ—subsequently found to have developed the disease, but when the workman is so found to be in any stage of silicosis he is offered the compensation applicable to that stage of the disease and, on his acceptance and quitting underground employment, or if he remains in spite of such notice and works underground and subsequently reaches an advanced state of the disease, he will only be entitled to the compensation first offered and not to any higher amount.

The compensation for the ante-primary state is a lump sum of \$500. For the primary it is \$1,000, and the secondary stage entitles the workman to 66 2-3 per cent. of his wages for life. It is to be noted that ante-primary plus tuberculosis puts a man in the secondary class and it is compulsory that when a man shows tuberculosis underground he must leave. He has not the same right to stay as though he had silicosis only. The reason for this stand as to tuberculosis is that he is a menace to his fellow-workmen, and it is because of the tuberculosis feature of underground employment that the government compels the examination of the men as provided by the amendment to the Mining Act this session.

No change is being made in the present five-year period, as the government holds that it is too early in the development of the law to effect such a change. A thorough study and check will be made under the new provisions so that equity will be done any persons who perchance may be penalized by the five-year period.

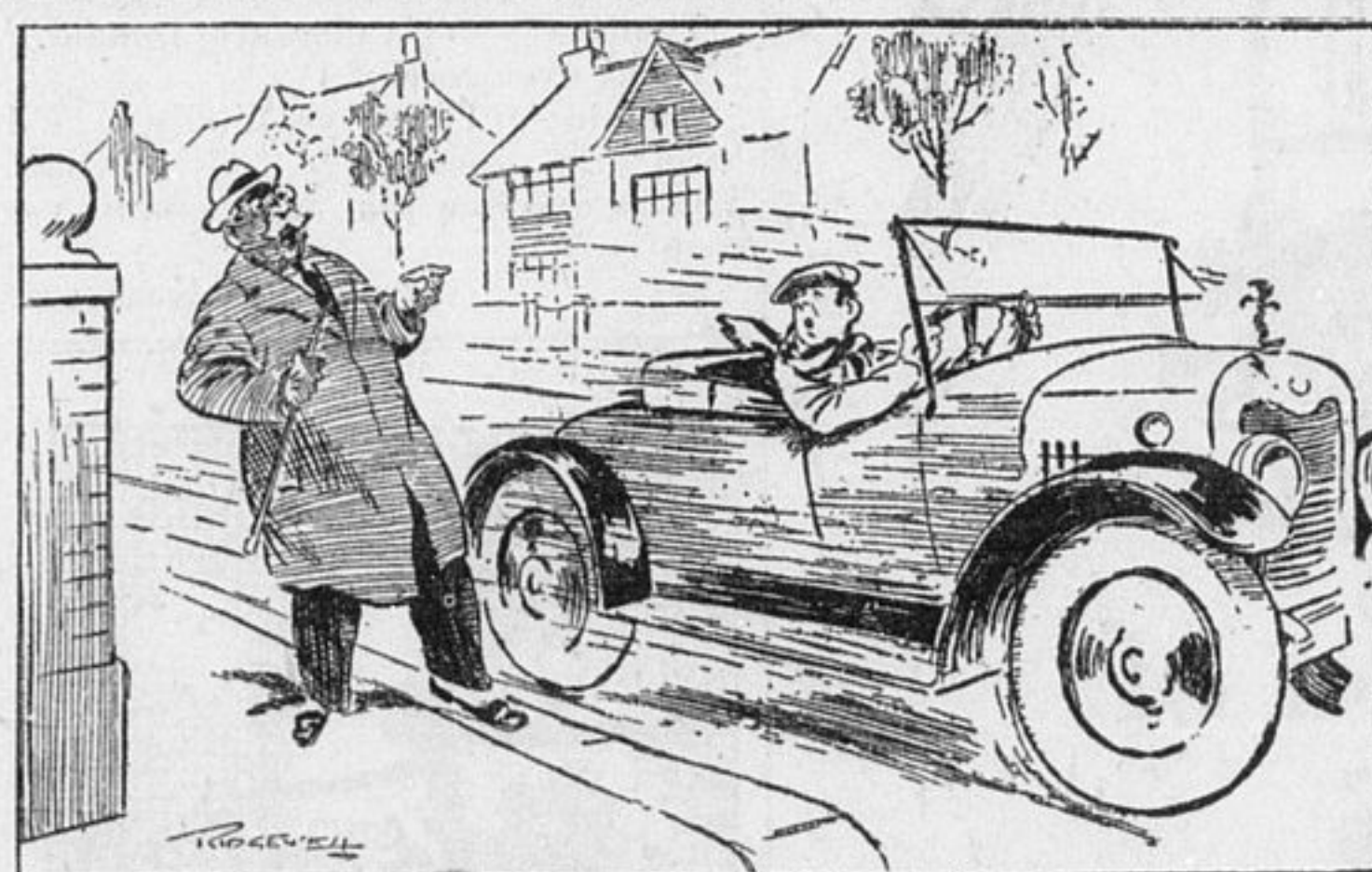

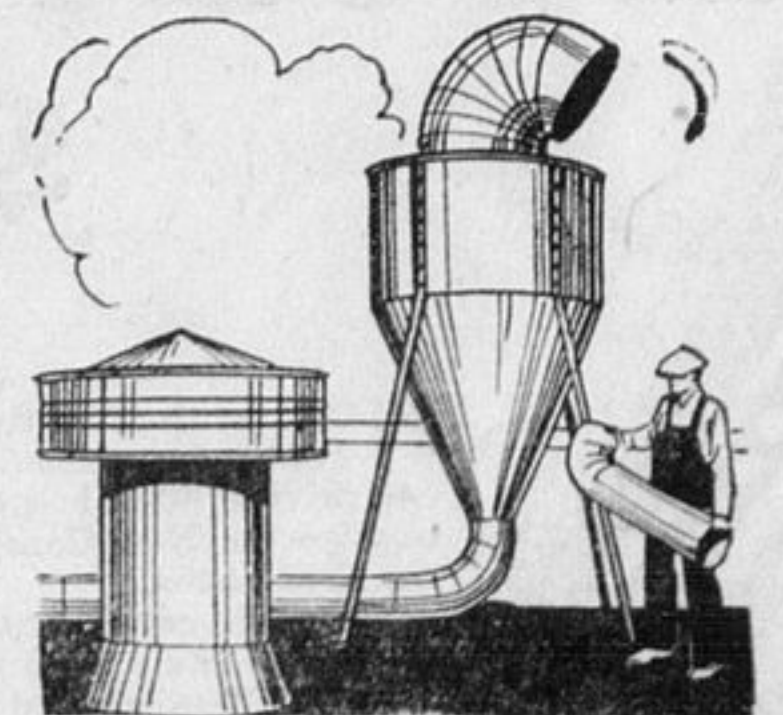
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
