

Timmins and District Notes

Mr. A. W. Lang was a visitor to Cobalt and Haileybury last week.

Mrs. L. G. Greenstone, of Montreal, visited friends here last week.

New Liskeard is considering the holding of an Old Home Week the first week in July.

Rev. R. A. Spencer, of Dundalk, and formerly pastor of Haileybury Methodist church, was recently elected Grand Master of the Orange Grand Black Chapter of Ontario West.

Some of the women of Sault Ste. Marie have started a campaign against cigarette smoking by girls and young women of all ages. They claim the habit has assumed undesirable proportions among the ladies of the Sault.

Messrs McCamus, Thompson and Craven, of the head office of the Temiskaming Telephone Co., New Liskeard, were in town this week in connection with the matter of dealing with the town council for the renewal of the telephone franchise in Timmins.

A combination chemical, hose truck and pump has been purchased by New Liskeard for its fire department, the new motor equipment costing \$10,600, and being of the noted American LaFrance Co. make. Delivery of the new motor truck is expected by July 1st.

Haileybury had an unusually good record in the matter of fires last year, the fire chief's report submitted to the Haileybury council some days ago showing that in 1927 the town had only 15 fires, the total damage being \$1,072.00. There were only 30 fire alarms turned in during the year.

Homer L. Gibson & Co. apparently intend to keep right up to the moment in the use of all available modern inventions. The Homer L. Gibson Co. are now broadcasting a review of the important price movements in the mines each evening from Station CKGW, Toronto, operating on a wave length of 312 meters.

E. H. Walker & Co.'s Bulletin in its last issue says:—Last year the mines of Canada paid to their stockholders dividends totalling \$27,446,072.85. Of this sum two companies, Hollinger and Consolidated Smelters, distributed \$12,750,862.50, while several other companies paid out considerably more than a million each.

Illustration of the wide use of the airplane in prospecting and mining work in the North of Canada is given by the fact that recently airplanes were used by prospectors staking at Favourable Lake, over 200 miles north of Hudson, Ont., while at the same time other prospectors used airplanes to go prospecting at Reindeer Lake, 800 miles northwest of Winnipeg, where rich finds of copper, zinc and lead were reported.

The annual competition conducted by The Haileyburian relative to the date the ice will go out of Lake Temiskaming is on again. Each year The Haileyburian gives a year's subscription to the paper to the person guessing nearest to the correct date of the ice going out. The earliest in the past thirty-five years was April 12th, in 1902, and the latest May 21st in 1923.

A case to come before the District Court at Haileybury on April 3rd, is that brought by A. G. Brooks against Paul Villeneuve, Kapuskasing, for alleged breach of contract on a building in Kapuskasing. The sum of \$800.00 is asked for damage caused by the alleged breach of contract, for freight on material, etc. The defence is that no contract was entered into and that the work was given to another contractor after waiting a reasonable time for prices and particulars from the plaintiff.

HUNDREDS OF MILES OF FILM SHOT IN BIG WAR COMEDY

Some idea of the task which confronted Raoul Walsh in editing the motion picture, "What Price Glory," which comes to the Goldfields theatre on Friday and Saturday of this week, can be seen from the information that the footage which was run up on the production amounted to just a little more than 100 miles. Just for one look at all the reels Walsh had to sit in the projection room for ten consecutive days of twelve hours each. When it is considered that he had to run through this footage a number of times in order to select a final version of "What Price Glory" it is easy to understand why directors must have good constitutions.

Sitting with Walsh was Salvatore A. Capodice, world war hero who was wounded seventeen times and lost a leg in the engagement of Belleau Wood, where Laurence Stallings was similarly wounded. Capodice was with the 67th Company, Fifth Regiment, U.S. Marine Corps. He was technical advisor to Walsh from the time Walsh began to work on "What Price Glory" in order to make sure about details, which are bound to be scrutinized by men who fought overseas.

The elimination of material for building up the story was comparatively easy, as the Fox version of "What Price Glory" follows strictly the drama written by Laurence Stallings and Maxwell Anderson. Walsh's difficulty was to select the best of the exterior shots.

CLASSES FOR MINING PROSPECTORS

A class for Mining Prospectors will be opened under the auspices of the Ontario Department of Mines, at Timmins, on Thursday, April 5th, 1928, and will be continued for eight days. Morning sessions will be held in the Oddfellows Hall. Evening lectures will be given in the Central Public School.

The course will cover the practical study of minerals and practice in mineral spotting and rocks; also instruction in elementary geology and chemistry.

The Classes will be under the direction of Dr. E. M. Burwash, late lecturer in geology, University of British Columbia, who will also deliver evening lectures illustrated by slides on geological topics. They will begin at 10 a.m., and thereafter as may be announced.

Classes and lectures are free of charge.
